They made the flight across the Mediterranean to Algiers in five hours. They were unharmed for more than 12 hours on their return flight and were believed to have been lost.

## DECISION GIVEN AFTER ATTEMPTED SUICIDE

Sensational Case Remanded To Lower Court By Supreme Court.

Mrs. J. J. Bailey of Bend attempted suicide just one day too soon. A dispatch today from Bend gives news of her attempting to end her life by taking strychnine.

Mrs. Bailey had been convicted of luring a rancher neighbor to her cabin and by the aid of her 14 year old son, tying him, while she searched his person for valuable papers. It seems that Mrs. Bailey had borrowed \$500 from this neighbor and that when she tried him up and snatched his home, she was looking for that note. She got the \$500 note and burned it up according to the testimony. She also tried to force the man, Mr. Rawlings, to drink what he thought was laudanum. Not only that, but she rode with him to his home and stood guard over him while her 14 year old son went through his trunk and took out a patent for a ranch Mrs. Bailey wanted to buy.

On an error in cross examination, the supreme court remanded the case back to the Deschutes county circuit court for re-trial. The case is of special interest as it was given general publicity in Deschutes county and just when the supreme court decides in her favor Mrs. Bailey attempts suicide. Her sentence was from three to 15 years in the penitentiary. Now she will have another chance after she recovers.

British Empire Insurance Co. vs. Ernest Hasenmeyer, appellant. Appeal from Multnomah county. Suit to collect money on corporation stock. Opinion by Justice Harris. Judge J. P. Kavanaugh affirmed.

Peter Andrew, appellant, vs. Oregon Washington Railroad Navigation company; appeal from Multnomah county; suit to collect damages for personal injury, and destruction of personal property. Opinion by Justice Burnett; Judge George M. Davis affirmed.

E. B. Bryson, receiver, substituted for S. A. Sanford, trustee, vs. Sarah L. Day et al appellant; appeal from Douglas county; suit to foreclose mortgage; opinion by Justice Benson; decree of Judge G. F. Skipworth modified in holding that the trial court erred in subjecting Mrs. Day's property to the payment of the Olla Mining company's debt. Decree modified to the extent of subjecting no more than one-fifth of the proceeds of the mortgaged premises to the satisfaction of plaintiff's judgment upon the note of the Olla Mining company.

Washington, Jan. 28.—When Uncle Sam bids good-bye he loses a billion dollars a year in revenue. But Sam has got it all fixed today to get his billion just the same. DEEMS MOVE UNIMPORTANT. By J. W. T. Mason

(Written for the United Press.) New York, Jan. 28.—Shortening of the American line along the Archangel front because of attacks by the bolshevik army is a matter of no military importance and can have no effect upon the original reason for the presence of American soldiers in that area.

The Americans were sent to Archangel after the bolsheviks had made a separate peace with Germany for the purpose of preventing military stores at this entrance port into Russia from falling into German possession. The Archangel populace, acting under the principle of self-government prescribed by the bolsheviks, themselves welcomed the American and have been co-operating with them. Since the American landing urging of the Archangel populace have caused the allied troops to move southward far from the port for the purpose of establishing order. The Russian troops who have compelled a slight American retirement are representative of the resentment prevailing among the bolsheviks at foreign efforts to interfere with internal Russian affairs.

Only Alternative. There is not a sufficient allied force along the Archangel front to engage in a serious offensive operation and a strategic retirement is the only alternative left. There is no military advantage to be gained by extending the area of occupation in that part of Russia.

The town of Shonkursk, evacuated by the Americans, is 450 miles east of Petrograd and is quite isolated as far as the old battle front in western Russia is concerned. The Divina river where the American are operating; is not the Divina river along which the Russian operations were conducted by the Germans. There are two Russian rivers of that name. The Archangel Divina is 450 to 500 miles east of Petrograd while the Riva Divina is 300 miles south west of Petrograd. The Americans along the former river are thus cut off from any communication with the outside world except by means of the Arctic sea.

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SENATE BILLS.

S. B. 85. By Farrell. Increasing automobile speed limits from 25 to 30 miles.

## Strikes In England Are Continuing Unchanged

London, Jan. 28.—The industrial war which has broken out in Great Britain and Ireland in the beginning of a fight in the interests of demobilized soldiers, labor officials declared today. They denied that the strikes are in any way connected with bolshevism.

The strike situation which resulted in paralyzing of shipbuilding and seriously affected other industries, was unchanged early today, though it was believed the trouble would be extended later through sympathetic walkouts. Nearly 200,000 men were on strike in various parts of the country.

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## Jap Favors Inter-Alleed Control Of Siberian Roads

Tokio, Jan. 26.—(Delayed.)—Foreign Minister Uchida today in the house of peers defended the government in its stand for inter-allied control of the Siberian railroads.

Answering the government's severer critics, Uchida declared he did not believe the lines should be under the control of a single power. He defended the government's action in sharing control with the United States and Great Britain.

"I do not believe control of these railroads should be vested in a single power," he said.

"Russia's promise to the Okuma cabinet does not give Japan vested rights in the China Eastern nor the Chang-chun Sungan line."
