ACTIVITIES IN HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

The red flag bill which caused so much outcry finally passed the house, not as the labor delegates wanted, but as recommended by a majority of the committee that had been working on the bill for ten days.

The labor representatives were fighting for the insertion of a phrase that might permit the use of a red flag or other disloyal emblem, providing it was not used to manifest disloyalty. But the great majority of the house voted on the proposition that carrying a red flag was part of the general I. W. W. plan and refused to line up with the labor element. The word "disloyalty" was also allowed to stand in the bill.

The Marion county delegation lined up with the majority report of the committee excepting Mr. Weeks, who voted with the labor element, as represented by two delegates from Portland, who were trying to practically kill the bill.

Should the red flag bill finally become a law, carrying of such an emblem will invite trouble with the authorities in Oregon.

In addition to the departments of agriculture, labor and a department of institutions, a bill was introduced yesterday for the organization of a department of health. However, as the four department bills would practically put out of a job most of the politicians in the state house, there is little fear that any of them will pass.

Harvey Wells, commissioner of insurance, in whose behalf a bill was introduced boosting his salary from \$3000 a year to \$4200 did not lose as much before the salary committee of the house as did J. A. Churchill, superintendent of state schools. The bill for Mr. Churchill was to raise his salary from \$3000 to \$4500. Mr. Wells' prospective raise of \$1200 a year was cut to \$600 and that of Mr. Churchill \$1,500 a year. The salary committee decided to recommend a raise of \$600 a year for each. However, this is up to the senate and governor. It is understood a bill will be introduced making the salary of the governor \$10,000 a year and it is also understood the governor is in favor of the various salary increases, including that of the judges of the supreme court.

Representative Kuhl proposed three cheers for Old Glory yesterday afternoon in the house just before the vote was to be taken on the red flag bill. But the members were so intent on voting the bill through and cutting off long winded addresses, that his motion received no second and the voting proceeded.

In order to give the public some practical information on the building of roads and to demonstrate just what kind of a road is best adapted for Oregon, Representative Bean of Eugene presented a bill directing the state highway commission to construct and lay, under its own supervision 15

miles of hard surface road in one continuous stretch at some point on the Pacific highway. The bill provides that five miles of the road is to be of bituminous material, five miles of concrete and five miles of wood blocks. Mr. Bean also introduced a bill providing for the construction and maintenance of fish hatcheries on the Santiam river in Marion county.

Representative Smith of Portland is becoming just a little peeved especially when he takes note of the fact that when there is a bill to be rushed thru, the need of the returning soldiers is hatched on to make easier sailing for the bill. He served notice that hereafter, at least from his standpoint, it would be unfashionable to bring in the returning soldier boy when a bill was presented for immediate passage.

lied peace conference. The secret treaties have been the source of hundreds of secret conferences in parliamentary circles and behind closed doors of embassies and foreign offices. The secret treaties are the keystone of that discredited, grasping diplomacy for which President Wilson desires to substitute an international spirit of fair dealing.

Differences Arise.

Since Wilson arrived in Europe there has been growing evidence that between him and the spokesmen of the allies certain seemingly irreconcilable differences have arisen. These will probably not vanish until the public here knows the truth and acts. The reason for these differences does not lie in the opinions of Premier Lloyd George, Premier Clemenceau or Premier Orlando, whatever their opinions may happen to be. None of these men is at liberty to fashion a really democratic peace, for they are bound by a set of agreements from which they dare not depart. These agreements, some in the form of secret treaties duly signed and sealed, and other more "gentlemen's agreements," between the various governments, dominate the situation. While they exist the European representatives at Versailles are not free agents. They are mere attorneys, pledged to negotiate for their clients out and dried schedules of annexations and trade restrictions which have nothing to do with democracy.

If the secret treaties stand, the war, from America's standpoint, will have been fought in vain and yet, with the various European governments committed, their agents at Versailles can only be free to act if the peoples of the allied countries make such a demand for the repudiation of these reactionary agreements that the entente governments will unanimously agree to drop them overboard.

Former Monmouth Resident Passes Away At Harbor

Monmouth, Or., Jan. 29.—Word received from Mrs. Hazel Tolman of Harbor, Oregon, tells of the recent death of her father, Samuel Work, who for many years was a resident and citizen of Monmouth, making his home with his sister, Mrs. Coleman, until her death last year. Since that time he has lived with his daughter at Harbor. One son, Glen Work, also survives him. The remains were buried at Smith River, just across the line in California.

Another of Monmouth's soldier boys has made the supreme sacrifice. Robert Holloway, son of Mrs. Margaret J. Thomas, now living in California, was a member of company L, and according to a dispatch from the war department was killed in action on Nov. 3. The family lived in Monmouth for some time previous to his enlistment and are well and favorably known here. "Ted" was a sophomore in high school and was a favorite with his class-mates. His death makes the fifth of the Monmouth boys and all have been killed in action.

MEETING OF LOGGERS AND LUMBERMEN HELD YESTERDAY EVENING

New Constitution Passed On And Officers Elected For Coming Season.

Hurst hall was crowded to the walls last night with members of the "Four L's" organization drawn out by the address of Director W. D. Smith of Portland and by their interest in the election of local officers. It was an orderly, attentive interested crowd everyone of them carrying the air of a stockholder in a syndicate. Director Smith, who is a live wire on the platform as well as in the ranks, showed that he was in close touch with all the operations and conditions in the Loggers' and Lumbermen's Loyal Legion and his talk was straight from the shoulder, not only with regard to the employers but the members as well.

His address made it plain that while the legion is in form a labor union, it is an organization that stands for harmony and co-operation. He made a strong plea for the spirit of good will between employer and employee, who should be able to meet together as equals and partners. He demanded of the workers that they keep up their end by efficiency in production—that they bag out the "red flag" from their ranks and keep down dissension and politics. He read a long list of the more important lumbering concerns of the northwest that were now aligned with the legion and they had managed to get along without friction through to system of arbitration.

He called attention again to the familiar pledge of the legion which binds the members to promote harmony between capital and labor, to work for the betterment of conditions among the workers to respect the law and maintain loyalty to the government.

The new constitution and by-laws was read through with explanatory comment as to its workings. Among other things it stands for the eight-hour day, for the standardizing of all living conditions in camps and mills, for the development of the community spirit among employees, for co-operation in all lines. It provides for an efficient employment service and for a benefit fund for the sick and destitute. It bars out from affiliation all men who were known to have shirked military duty in the world war.

The amended constitution was received without a word of opposition from the ranks. Following the reading, the

General Brice P. Disque says the business of the spruce division in Oregon and Washington cannot be closed up under one or two years.

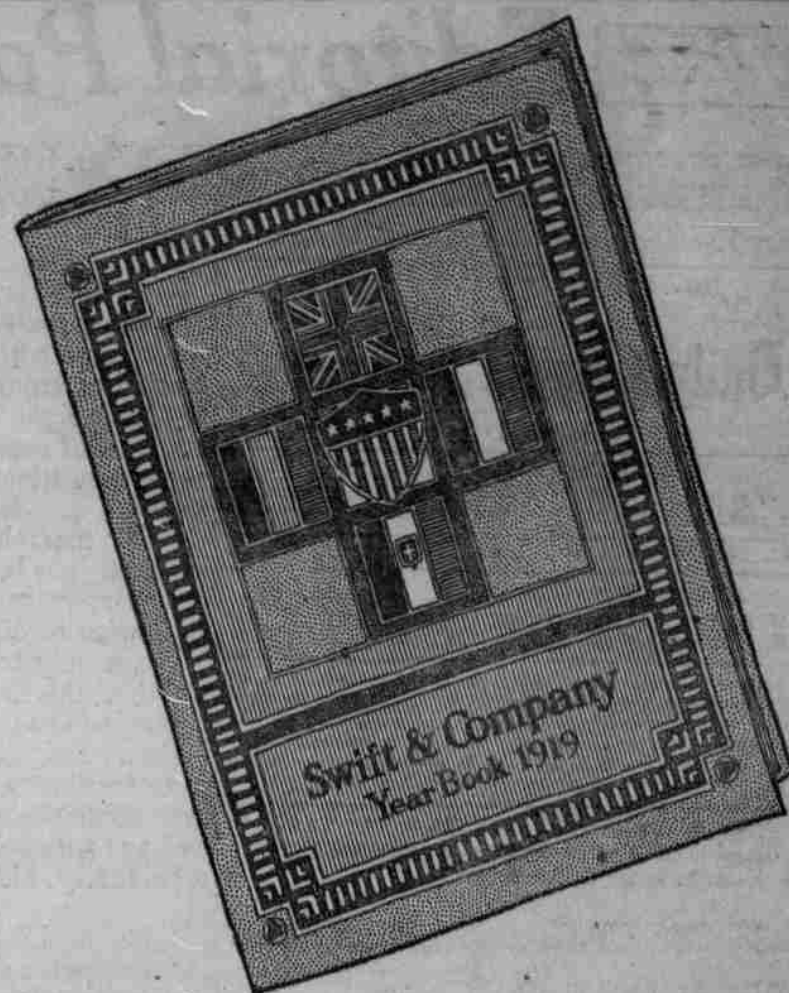

GENERAL STRIKE IS GROWING IN ISLANDS

Expected That Every Class Of Labor Will Be Affected Before Long.

London, Jan. 29.—The general strike was growing in Great Britain and Ireland today. It was expected that before night every class of labor would be affected.

Thirty thousand more joined the strike in the Glasgow district making a total of 70,000 out there. Business in Belfast remained at a standstill. Nearly a quarter of a million laborers had walked out in various parts of the country completely tying up shipbuilding and crippling coal mining and allied industries.

Looting Breaks Out.

Belfast, Jan. 29.—Looting has broken out here in connection with the general strike, resulting in frequent clashes between the police and rioters. Several persons were injured when policemen charged into the crowds last night.

Fifty thousand linen workers threatened to join the strike today. A food shortage was said to be imminent. Other unions were debating sympathetic walkouts.

Former Salem Man Heals Eugene Chamber

Mr. Simmons while a comparatively new member of the chamber, has been very active in the several departments with which he has been connected lately and it was largely his work in various warrentivities and his efforts as chief of the social bureau that landed him in the president's chair.

J. E. Shelton, editor of the Daily Guard, was the choice for vice president and B. B. Brandage, cashier of the Bank of Commerce, was chosen as treasurer.—Eugene Register.

REVOLUTION IN RUMANIA

Vienna, Jan. 28.—(Delayed).—A revolution is raging throughout Rumania, according to dispatches received from Budapest today.

Fighting started Saturday when home coming soldiers clashed with the troops of the regular army stationed in permanent garrisons. Bloody encounters occurred in several cities, continuing in Bucharest throughout Sunday.

Social democrats are reported to have joined the revolutionists.
