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BILL REPEALS POWER OF PROTEST AGAINST ROADS

Another Proposed Law Provides Compulsory Military Training In High School

Power of property owners to block county road construction or improvement by reemancipation is repealed by the provisions of a bill introduced in the senate today by Senator Shaaka. The bill eliminates entirely the present form of reemancipation and provides that after the county commissioners have received the report of the road viewers and have given property owners an opportunity to be heard they may proceed with the road improvement if they deem it advisable. Senators Thomas and Lachmund introduced another bill relating to paying specifications. The bill provides that all bids for the construction of highways or streets shall be based upon plans and specifications which shall be filed in the office of the official calling for the bids previous to the issuance of the call or bids. The bill is intended for another job at the patented pavement concerns and is supposed to shut such concerns out from submitting their own specifications as a basis for their bids. Senator Hurley introduced a bill this afternoon providing for compulsory military training in every high school in the state, and requiring every boy in such schools to take the training, unless excused for certain specified reasons. Would Have Commissions. A non-salaried commission, to consist of the superintendent of public instruction and two other members, one each to be appointed by the boards of regents of the U. of O. and the O. A. C., is created to prescribe a course in military training and to adopt rules in relation to it. An officers' training camp is to be established at the University of Oregon, for which an appropriation of \$20,000 is provided to cover the cost of employing instructors and buying guns, ammunition and other equipment. It is provided that the measure shall become effective next September and not less than three hours a week shall be devoted to physical training and military drill. Another bill, introduced today by the senate judiciary committee makes it unlawful for any person or firm to solicit on account of claims for personal injuries to any person. It strikes at what is known as the "ambulance chaser," or persons who engage in the business of working up suits for damages as the result of accidents. The bill makes it unlawful for any lawyer to accept from any such solicitor any claim for damages, or to bring an action for damages on account of any claim obtained by such attorney from such solicitor. The bill provides a penalty of a fine not to exceed \$1000 for violations of the act. To Speed up Circuit Courts. A bill "for the more speedy and efficient transaction of the business of the various circuit courts in this state" was introduced by the senate judiciary committee. It confers upon the chief justice of the supreme court the power to assign circuit judges to hold court in any county in the state during any term of court and makes it the duty of the chief justice to see that a sufficient number of judges is assigned to duty from time to time in the several counties to transact the business of the court as promptly and as expeditiously as possible consistent with the orderly administration of justice. Senate bill 79, by Bell, came up for third reading in the senate, but was referred to the committee on education when a number of the senators objected to allowing it to apply to school districts of the first class. It provides that the county treasurer shall be custodian of all school funds and that such funds can be disbursed only upon warrants drawn upon the treasurer. The senate passed the following bills: S. B. 86. By the judiciary committee. Providing that tenants who rent property month by month must give 30 days notice before vacating. S. B. 71. By Jones. Prohibiting the operation of saloons in the Siuslaw river. H. B. 60. B. Sheldon. Empowering the state highway commission to sell unsuitable equipment. The senate also passed house joint resolution No. 7, which provides for the appointment of two senators and three representatives as a committee to investigate the cost of codifying the laws of Oregon and having them published. Another house resolution was passed, which invites any person or organization to offer suggestions on plans for reconstruction for the benefit of the returning soldiers.

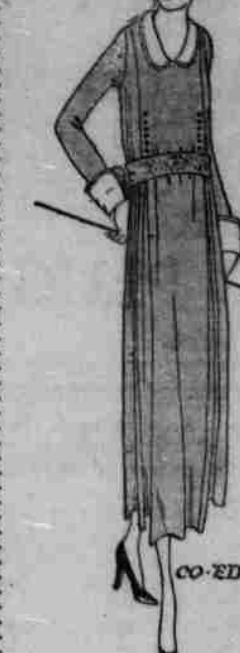
