MONMOUTH NORMAL SCHOOL CUT \$10,000

Fish And Game Commission Fares Better, However—Receives Full Amount.

The Monmouth Normal school was cut \$10,000 in the amount it asked for in appropriations for the coming two years by the joint ways and means committee of the house and senate in its session last night.

As to whether the Monmouth Normal should charge more than the \$6 tuition President Ackerman thought it was enough as he found 75 per cent of the students had but little money. He rather favored free tuition.

In cutting of \$10,000 from the amount asked for the committee on motion of Senator Lachmann planned the \$3000 required for the rebuilding of the furnace and heating plant, \$6000 on excess mileage and \$1000 from the amount asked for to maintain the school's library.

The fish and game commission fared better with the ways and means committee. It asked for \$69,400 and received the full amount. E. W. Warren of the fish and game commission ably presented the needs of the amount being his claim that as an investment the fishery interests of the state paid big dividends in taxes on property invested in the fishing and canning business.

To show what fishing interests of the Columbia really meant, the statement was made that for every acre of river space, the fishing interest amounted to \$55 an acre. The only hatchery for the Columbia river was in the Willamette river, it was stated. For the amount asked for, about \$35,000 a year, it was stated that the state of Oregon received \$300,000 a year in taxes from fish and its contingent industries.

UNITED STATES DID NOT KNOW OF SECRET PACT

Understanding Among Allies That Treaties Shouldn't Be Uncovered.

By Amos Pinchot (Written for the United Press.) Washington, Jan. 30.—The United States apparently entered the war in ignorance of the secret treaties arranged by the allies, which now constitute an obstacle to a permanent, democratic peace.

There is every reason to believe that neither President Wilson nor the state department learned of the secret treaties until months after war was declared, in April, 1917. It is also practically certain that when Foreign Secretary Balfour and former Premier Viviani came here early in the summer of 1917, as heads of the British and French missions, they failed to apprise this government of the existence of the treaties—for the reason there was an understanding between the British, French and Russian governments that they should be kept under cover.

The text of the secret treaties was smuggled into the United States by a Russian sailor in January, 1918. Russian residents of New York placed them in the hands of the writer. Every effort was made to give the treaties publicity. They were, in fact, published in one newspaper of limited circulation, but beyond that a general press taboo seemed to have been placed on them. Many attempts were made to convince senators and congressmen that it was their duty to put the secret treaties into the congressional record, but they contended either that it was "impossible" or "unprofitable." It is not believed that even today a score of senators and congressmen have read the secret treaties in their entirety.

Secret Treaties Not Binding. Representatives of allied countries have been quoted as saying there are no binding treaties, but only informal memoranda. The British-French-Italian Russian treaty, however, is by no means an "informal memorandum." On the contrary, it is a binding contract signed and delivered in London April 26, 1915, and generally referred to as the "London pact." It was signed by Grey for Great Britain, Cambon for France, Imperiali for Italy and Benckendorff for Russia. It is the contract setting forth the price to be paid for Italy entering the war "with all the forces at her command." The treaty has 16 articles, which provide for vast territorial concessions to be made to Italy "under the imminent treaty of peace." The word "imminent" was no doubt used because, at that time it was generally assumed that Italy's intervention would bring a quick and favorable decision. This treaty is the source of at least
