SCHOOL CUT \$10,000

Fish And Game Commission Fares Better, However .-Receives Full Amount.

The Monmouth Normal school was aut \$10,000 in the amount it asked for in appropriations for the coming two years by the joint ways and means committee of the house and scante in its acssion

lest night.

J. H. Ackerman, president of the normal school, presented its needs to the committee. He said it was the only school in the state training teachers es-pecially for the teaching of rural school and that if his appropriation was cut, this good work could not go on. He told of the practical experience given normal teachers, working in the Inspendence school and other nearby

As to whether the Monmouth Normal should charge more than the \$6 tuition President Ackerman thought it was enough as he found 75 per cent of the students had but little money. He rather favored free tuition.
