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## Kenneth Neff Fifth 65th Regiment Arrives in U. S.

Rev. F. H. Neff of this city recently received a message from his son, Kenneth, telling of his safe arrival with the 65th artillery corps in Philadelphia coming from France in the steamer Haverford. Kenneth was mixed up in some of the liveliest fighting on the front, taking part in the big gun work at Chateau-Thierry and other important engagements. Remarkably enough his entire regiment came through the fighting with the loss of only three men, though nearly a hundred were wounded. Within a period of 70 days the 65th discharged something like 15,000 tons of steel and explosives into the Hun camps from five different points. Kenneth is especially proud of the fact that the 65th was the only American organization that had a chance to use the huge 9-inch English Howitzers, one of the most deadly weapons on the entire front.

Another thing the boys are proud of is the fact that in all the period of service the 65th never recorded the court-martial of either an officer or an enlisted man. Furthermore the records of the commanding officer, Colonel Kerfoot, of Kansas, show that the conduct of all the boys under fire and in the most trying circumstances, was most exemplary.

The regiment got the nickname of the "circuit artillery" because of their numerous moves from one point to another. And all these moves meant some work as Kenneth can personally testify, as some of the huge guns weighed in the neighborhood of 30,000 pounds.

On their arrival in Philadelphia the regiment numbering 2197 men, were met and entertained with a standing luncheon by women of various war organizations, and made to feel glad they were alive and back on American soil. After luncheon they were marched to the Pennsylvania railroad station and embarked for Camp Dix, from which point they will be sent across the continent for final discharge at Camp Lewis. Kenneth anticipates that he will arrive on the coast within the next two weeks.

The 65th artillery is composed mainly of Oregon, California and Washington boys. About 600 of them were with Colonel C. C. Hammond at Fort Stevens, being stationed for a time at the mouth of the Columbia training with the big guns. A large proportion of them are from Portland, but various points in the valley are represented besides Salem, about 20 calling from Albany.

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RETURN TO SALEM.

Mrs. William McCallum, who had spent the past two weeks with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Lee Henkle, left Corvallis this morning for Salem, where she will spend a short time looking after property interests, and later will proceed to her home in Portland. Mrs. McCallum came to Corvallis to attend the funeral of her brother, the late Arthur Henkle, Portland and former Corvallisite whose body was brought here for interment.—Corvallis Gazette-Times.

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
