formation he could not divulge, he would either divulge it to me or he would not get my vote. If I am not fit to be entrusted with the information I am not fit to be on the board."
Senator Pierce wanted to know how many men were still employed on the military police, and how much was going to be appropriated for them.
Senator Smith of Josephine said he didn't think they would get any appropriation at all.
"The emergency board is not supposed to possess any legislative powers," he said, "but it exercised legislative authority when it voted funds to create a military police. Since the board has done this, I see no way to pay the bill. As a member of the next emergency board, I wish to say that if any proposition of this nature comes up I shall vote against it."
Senator Patterson reminded the senators of the old days when gambling was wide open at the state fair two or three officers were enough to keep order.
"But at the last fair there were 40 or 50 members of the state police at the fair grounds to keep order," he said. "That is where some of this \$250,000 was spent."
"I would like to impress again on the members of the emergency board, that if any member tells them that he wants an appropriation to meet a situation about which he has information which he cannot divulge I hope they will refuse to vote the money."

JOURNAL WANT ADS PAY
The sum of money appropriated by the state emergency board during the past two years was passed by the house Thursday afternoon and by the senate Friday afternoon. It was signed by the governor yesterday afternoon at 5 o'clock and by 5:30 o'clock was filed in the office of the secretary of state. All of which looks like quick work. But the fact is, while the money appropriated by the emergency board was costing the state \$2000 a month interest no action was taken by the governor or emergency board to stop the appropriation through and get this interest charge until the legislature had been in session about three weeks. As the money had already been spent, the legislators had nothing to do but vote it and there was no fight in either the senate or house. The bill could have been put through early in the session and saved the state interest amounting to \$1000.
Delegates from each of the colleges in the intercollegiate oratorical association are in session this afternoon at Willamette university. The meeting was called to choose judges on composition and delivery for the "Old Line" oratorical contest to be held March 8 at the University of Oregon. As yet Willamette university has not held its try out contest. Last year Miss Evadne Harrison represented Willamette. The prize was won a year ago by Abraham Rosenberg of the University of Oregon at the contest held in the First Methodist church of Salem. Colleges interested in the intercollegiate oratorical association are Oregon Agricultural college, University of Oregon, McMinnville college, Pacific University, Pacific college, Eugene Bible school and the Oregon Normal school.
The Salem Heights Sunday school, which has been suspended during the influenza epidemic, will resume its regular sessions tomorrow, February 2.
The pupils of the Garfield school are rejoicing in the possession of a new victrola, presented by parents and friends of the teachers and pupils.
Next Wednesday evening, February 5, there will be the first in a series of lectures at the public library. This will be on the subject "Bolshevism in Russia" by William Galvani. Following this in the coming weeks will be the course of instructive addresses on "France—the country and the people," which will begin with a lecture by Carl Gregg Doney.

relations of the Czechs and Poles in that representative are sitting at the same peace conference to arrange a treaty with a common enemy, yet there are outbreaks of fighting between their own troops over the question of readjustments of their own boundaries. A temporary settlement by the allied commission will be followed by final settlement by the league of nations when the latter institution is formally established.
Speculation as to whether the Philippines and the Panama canal will be considered in the internationalization of colonial possessions and waterways was ended today when it was authoritatively stated that neither would be brought up, as both are strictly American and free from any dispute. It was pointed out that the Monroe doctrine will not be disturbed as it will fit automatically with the league of nations.
