NATIVE OF SILVERTON PASSES

Mrs. T. D. Allen died at the tamily home in this city Thursday evening MONEY to loan on good real estate. after an illness covering a period of nearly six months. The funeral was held at the home Saturday afternoon and the body was interred in the Silverton cemetery. Mayor L. J. Adams delivered the funeral address and paid high tribute to the estimable lady who had lived a life in Silverton beyond

The cause of her death is said to nave been causer of the liver. She had suffered from this for some little time and has been confined to her bed most of the time since the early part of December.

Mrs. Allen was born in the Waldo Hills five miles from Silverton on November 1, 1857, and was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Erhardt Wolfard, pioners who settled in Silverton in 1853. June 4th, 1881, she was married to T. D. Allen, sen of another pioneer family, and immediately after the wedding they commenced housekeeping on the ranch where she lived the remainder of her life. This ranch has since became a part of the city of Silverton and many homes have been erecte upon what was once the Allen farm. She is survived by her husband, four sons, R. G., L. Clay, Ployd W. and Dewey R.; two daughters, Mrs. Wynola Ottowny and Miss Paye A. Allen, all of Silverton. Also one brother, John Wolfard, and two sisters, Miss Mary Wolfard and Mrs. J. H.
