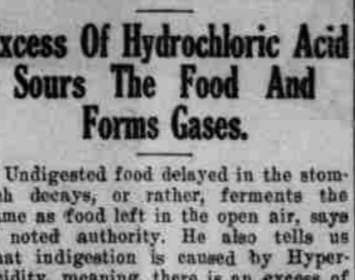

NATIVE OF SILVERTON PASSES

Mrs. T. D. Allen died at the family home in this city Thursday evening after an illness, covering a period of nearly six months. The funeral was held at the home Saturday afternoon and the body was interred in the Silvertown cemetery. Mayor L. J. Adams delivered the funeral address and paid high tribute to the estimable lady who had lived a life in Silvertown beyond reproach.

The cause of her death is said to have been cancer of the liver. She had suffered from this for some little time and has been confined to her bed most of the time since the early part of December.

Mrs. Allen was born in the Waldo Hills five miles from Silvertown on November 1, 1857, and was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Erhardt Wolford, pioneers who settled in Silvertown in 1853. June 4th, 1881, she was married to T. D. Allen, son of another pioneer family, and immediately after the wedding they commenced housekeeping on the ranch where she lived the remainder of her life. This ranch has since become a part of the city of Silvertown, and many homes have been erected upon what was once the Allen farm.

She is survived by her husband, four sons, R. G. L. Clay, Floyd W. and Dewey R.; two daughters, Mrs. Wynola Ottoway and Miss Faye A. Allen, all of Silvertown. Also one brother, John Wolford, and two sisters, Miss Mary Wolford and Mrs. J. H. Richer—Tribune.
