They issued a circular declaring living expenses are higher at Butte than at Seattle and that there should be a minimum wage of \$6 a day.
Death in Textile Strike.
Lawrence, Mass., Feb. 7.—The first death in the textile strike here occurred early today when Biaggio Venturo, 41, was shot by an unknown man.
It was reported that more workers returned to work at several mills, while others, it was said, planned to resume work Monday. There were fewer pickets about the mills today than on any day since the strike began.
The central labor union here, in a communication to the strikers urged them to return to the mills on the 48-hour work basis and to leave the wage dispute to be settled later.
