Surprising as it may seem, there has developed a certain amount of opposition to the laying of this sewer—a concession that should be made without a moment's hesitation, considering what the new plant would mean to the city of Salem. There are other towns in the valley that would make the most liberal concessions for a plant of this kind, and it is to be hoped that every possible encouragement will be given the projectors of this plant which will be a tremendous asset to Salem and Marion county.

Regardless of the high price of feed, poultry experts are predicting a great season for the poultry industry, partly on account of the wholesale slaughter of flocks during the winter. Anticipating this, Mr. and Mrs. C. N. Needham have opened up a unique "day old chick" store at 54 State street. They will soon have an exhibition in their front window a big colony of chicks representing five of the most popular breeds—White and Brown Leg horns, Barred Plymouth Rocks, Black Minorcas and Rhode Island Reds. These will be contracted from hatcheries known to be handling thoroughbred stock, and they expect to be able to furnish them to patrons at a cheaper rate than they can hatch them. They will be furnished in lots of any number from half a dozen up to a thousand, and will be open for business tomorrow. Anyone interested is invited to stop in and get free pamphlets dealing with the poultry industry and will also be given any information desired.

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PAROLES FOR AUTO THIEVES FROWNED ON BY STATE SENATORS

Dealers Are Demanding Action According To Those Supporting Bill.

Boys who are convicted the second time for stealing automobiles must not be given a parole by the circuit court, according to the sentiment expressed in the senate today when it passed senate bill 184, by Farrell. This bill provides that a parole shall not be granted to a person convicted the second or subsequent times for stealing such machines.

Senator Orton made the principal fight against the bill, saying it was the demand of automobile dealers for the blood of boys who cannot resist the temptation to steal automobiles. He relates some of his experiences as an employer of the juvenile court in Portland, insisting that boys should be given more than one chance to reform as long as they showed any signs of improving.

"From three to twenty automobiles are being stolen in Portland every day," said Senator Farrell, "and with scarcely any convictions. The automobile men are getting pretty sore about it and want something done to put a stop to it."

Boys who steal automobiles and are paroled without being punished return to their comrades and boast about how easy it is to steal a car and get off without punishment, declared Senator Huston, who favored the bill.

Hurley Opposed Bill. Senator Hurley opposed the bill, saying he could see no necessity for it. He declared the boy who "does not get out and raise a little hell is not worth much."

He argued that the court is in better position than anyone else to get at the facts and know what treatment to give the boys.

In the early days horse stealing was the universal offense, pointed out Senator Eddy, and now it is automobile stealing, and as horse stealing was frowned upon by severe laws so must auto stealing be frowned upon.

The vote on the bill follows: Yes—Baldwin, Bell, Dimick, Eberhard, Eddy, Houston, Jones, Luschmud, La Follet, Nickelsen, Patterson, Porter, Shanks, Smith, of Josephine, Wood, President Vinton.

No—Banks, Gill, Handley, Hurley, Moser, Norblad, Orton, Pierce. Absent—Howell.

House bill 310, by Sheldon, was passed by the senate, and as it carries an emergency clause it will become a law as soon as the governor signs it. This bill makes it a felony, subject to imprisonment for ten years, for anyone to escape or attempt to escape from the penitentiary.

The bill was passed under suspension of the rules at the request of Senator Moser, who said that Warden Stevens was urging immediate action on the measure as the convicts who have learned of the bill are becoming restless and

Other bills were passed by the senate today as follows: S. B. 210, by Eberhard, providing that a parole shall not be granted by the court after the person convicted as taken an appeal to the supreme court.

House Feels That Now Is Not Time To Propose Various Salary Advances

When members of the house are inclined to give each county the right to regulate its own county salaries, there is a growing feeling that now was not the right time to propose general salary advances.

It seems that the more the members think of the big salaries, the more inclined they are to take unfavorable action. This feeling has become so general that many are favorably inclined to the proposition of submitting the raises in salaries to a referendum vote of the people, as the chances are the people will soon be given a chance to vote on several general laws.

Secretary Oleott expressed his opinion as to salary raising as follows: "I understand a bill has been presented to the legislature embodying an increase of salary covering the offices of Governor, State Treasurer, Attorney General and Secretary of State.

While appreciating the good intent of the author I am constrained to say in justice to all in interest, that I have never been consulted in the matter and had no knowledge of it until I saw announcement of it in the press.
