He declared that the whole assump- tion that anybody should have a pa- tent on the proposition of mixing sand and broken rock and asphalt together was the rottenness fraud ever perpe- trated upon the people of the United States.

"How they ever put it over on somebody in the patent office I do not understand," he said.

Attacked Oregon Voter Editor. Senator Dimick made a vicious at- tack upon C. C. Chapman, editor of the Oregon Voter who was sitting at the press table in the senate. He de- clared that Chapman's publication is subsidized by the paving trust and other special interests, and compared Chapman to the beggar mentioned in the Bible who ate crumbs from the rich man's table, and said the only difference was that the Warren Con- struction company was a little more liberal to Chapman than was the rich man to the beggar.

President Vinton left the chair to make a talk in support of the major- ity report.

"These bills are intended only for one purpose, and that is to insure com- petitive bidding," he insisted.

He declared he would oppose the \$10,000,000 bond issue, especially the emergency clause, unless the four bills were passed so as to throw safeguards around the expenditure of money.

Senator Moser also spoke in sup- port of the majority report, declaring that the state highway commission, re- gardless of the high standard of the men on the commission, could not give the state a dollar's worth of pavement for a dollar spent because the legisla- ture had failed to enact laws which would force fair competition.

Senator Handley, Senator Hurley and Senator Banks spoke in support of the minority report, with its provi- sion to leave it to the highway com- mission to determine upon the quality and durability of the pavement on which bids are submitted.
