WON'T PREVENT LOBBYING

Lobbyists are not such bad things after all—or at least this is the view taken by the house of representatives. A bill introduced to prevent lobbying and to require such to register at the office of the secretary of state, was effectively killed. It seems that for years back certain lobbyists were always seen innocently wandering around viewing the scenery and by its action the house granted them a lease of life, without obliging them to tell what they were here for.

In a discussion of the bill to provide a different system of selecting jurists several lawyer members of the house almost called each other names. A lawyer did insinuate that Richards was sort of a tin-eup lawyer. Here, A. A. Smith and Gallagher, three lawyers on the committee which handled the bill, were satisfied without any change in the system. Three others, Richards, Lofgren and Scheubel wanted to improve on it. As the six lawyers on the committee stood 50-50, the house killed the bill.

The famous Rogue River bill came to the surface yesterday, and it all has to do with fishing in the Rogue river below the mouth of the Illinois river. The legislature of 1909 closed the river for promiscuous fishing. That of 1913 opened the river. Again the 1917 legislature closed the river and then once more by a referendum vote of the people, the river was opened.

In the final vote, the "common people" won out and instead of being killed, the bill was placed on the docket for third reading, which means that it will come up for a definite vote within a few days. Mr. Westerland of Medford who is vitally interested in the bill, managed to absent himself during roll call, although the sergeant at arms was twice sent out to get him. As soon as the vote was announced, Mr. Westerland appeared. He will have another chance when the bill comes up for final passage.

Attack On U. S. Naval Program

Tokio, Jan. 25.—(By Mail.)—Attack on America's naval program and demand for frankness in the Chinese situation featured the session of the house of representatives today. Kenjiro Kinoshita of the Shanshikan, in the course of a sensational address, he said: "America, regardless of the fact that she is the initiator of the league of nations, is now exerting herself to make her navy the greatest in the world. Besides, her plan to transform the island of Guam into one of her submarine bases threatens Japan's position in the Pacific. Is it right that American authorities on that island should have detain-

ATTEMPT TO ASSASSINATE LENINE WAS FRUSTRATED

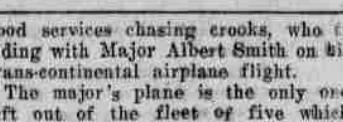
