report back to the unions in sympathy with the movement.

"Since then there has been stationed here soldiers to the number of several hundred to maintain order, but it has not been necessary to proclaim martial law, and the city is free from disturbances of any kind, except of a minor character, and probably will remain so.

"Much importance is placed on the vote of the engineers Saturday night. It is believed if they remain firm the backbone of the strike will be broken. Otherwise it will be prolonged indefinitely.

"So far not a shot has been fired. There have been no street gatherings or gatherings of various organizations. The police have had no trouble and it has not been necessary so far to put on extra men.

"Mining companies defend the cut in wages by citing the cut in price of copper and by declaring there is practically no market for copper.

"Under the new rate, miners would receive \$4.75 per day, which is 50 cents higher than the wage by mining scale based on the price of copper, as announced by at least one copper company some time ago.

"One reason advanced for the dissatisfaction over the wage cut is that living costs have not been reduced proportionately.

"In connection with this phase of the situation, it may be added that corrective steps are being taken, both locally and by the state legislature.

Financial Condition Good.
"The city's financial crisis was brought about by the refusal of banking and business interests to cash salary warrants on the ground that the city has exceeded its legal limit of indebtedness. At the present time, however, the financial conditions of the city are better than they have been in 25 years.

"At present only about \$125,000 in warrants outstanding are carried by the banking and business interests as contrasted with as much as \$500,000 in past years.

"With the exception of warrants of the June issue, which are 13 months in arrears, all city warrants bearing date previous to July last have been called and paid.

"Under present state laws practically every city and town in Montana is in the same shape financially as Salem. The loss from revenue through saloon licenses has lessened the city's revenues approximately \$75,000 per year.

"Efforts of the municipal league, an organization comprising officials of every city and town of the state, recently recommended to the state legislature that cities be authorized to increase the tax levies for general purposes from 10 to 15 mills.

"Because of the present industrial crisis, the order temporarily discharging firemen, policemen and other employees has been rescinded at the request of the military authorities.

"Banking and business interests have refused to cash any save firemen's warrants, feeling that the military will do the police work of the city."
