Constantinople and Greek girls being advertised "at reasonable prices" in Asia Minor, called for investigation and prompt steps to rescue them.

President Wilson's statement that the conference represents 1,200,000,000 people and his emphasis that the lowest workers in the most isolated sections of the world have figuratively been brought to the peace table, has established labor as one of the strongest

elements to be considered in the peace settlement. The work of the special committee on labor legislation has been held in abeyance until Samuel Gompers and other members return from Belgium.

peace when this war ended. Thus to revive the morale of the war weary soldiers and workers of our allies. These promises were not repudiated by any American when they were made. They were echoed in all the appeals to the American people, and they found ready response among them and no protest. The nation is thus pledged to the idea that what other nations are willing to undergo to secure the peace of the world, we should ourselves be willing to assume. Only now after the war, after the reaction of the end of the war and the impatience of the delays in reaching peace conditions, do we hear on the floor of the senate the criticisms of a league of nations.

It is during the war they would have been out of tune with the overflowing spirit of the American people and their determination to win this war and end the possibility of any such war in the future. Now we hear the claim that we did not go into this war for the benefit of the world but for our own selfish purposes.

"Senator Poinsett attacks the eighth article of the constitution of the league on disarmament as follows: 'The provision is unconstitutional and an impairment of the sovereignty and independence of this country.'

depend entirely upon the condition in which the entente leaves us," said Schiffer. "We must wait coolly until they decide. Germany's war credits and loans total 150,000,000 marks (\$40,000,000,000)."

Schiffer charged "crookedness" in conduct of the war especially by profiteers.

"The present economic situation also is desperate," he said. "The various strikes are unjustified. One great trouble is that country workers crowd into the city, whereas they are badly needed in the country."

Empire Faces Exhaustion. He said the empire faced exhaustion in October, 1918, but was tired over through the issuing of 15,000,000 marks (\$3,750,000,000) in unsecured notes. The last reichstag, he said, and not paid more than 15,000,000,000.

marks (\$4,500,000,000) of the whole debts.

Schiffer said he would not condemn the workmen's and soldiers' councils, as their organization was necessary for the success of the revolution in its initial stage, but he declared their rule had resulted in the misuse of tremendous funds. He proposed an official investigation of past expenditures and a survey of future needs. The 1918 taxes, he said, must total 19,000,000,000 marks (\$4,750,000,000), compared with five billion marks (\$1,250,000,000) just before the war.

Open debates are expected to end next week when the government plans to announce its appointments to the various commission that will handle details of legislative and administrative problems. The national assembly probably will be adjourned Thursday until the commissions complete their work.

May Make Taft U. of C. President.

San Francisco, Feb. 17.—William Howard Taft for the presidency of the University of California was urged here today by Victor H. Metcalf, who was secretary of the navy when Taft was president of the United States.

Paterson, N. J., Feb. 17.—Paterson's silk strike ended today when 17,000 strikers returned to work under a provisional settlement effected by the way labor board. The board's award calls for a forty-two and one half hour week.
