The proprietors of the Mitoma Hop ranch, five miles above Salem on the river, are making preparations to increase the big acreage of hops this season, making a total of nearly 120 acres. They have employed as their foreman Frank Fluke, formerly foreman of the Wiegman ranch at Independence. They estimate roughly that this ranch will produce about 250,000 pounds of hops this season, and that at the present price of hops the ranch would net them about \$180 an acre. As an evidence that the hop industry is still very much alive, Messrs. Durbin & Conover, as agents for the firm of Wigan, Richardson & Co., of London, are now offering 30 cents a pound for the 1919 crop.

Here is a good recipe for pickling:
Mix together: 4 lbs. salt; 2 lbs. brown sugar; 2 ounces pepper; 1 ounce salt peter.--Wash and clean 100 pounds of smelt, and stir them thoroughly in the above mixture, somewhat as you would flour them to fry. Pack in a jar or keg and put in a cool place. Place a weight on top to keep the fish under the brine. Do not add water, enough brine will form without it.
