Cattle Market Strong In Portland Union Yards

North Portland, Or., Feb. 20.—Today's run of live stock is light in all departments. Fewer cars of cattle, hogs and sheep are in the yards than have been in on a Monday for many months. However, this is the time of year that receipts begin to drop off, and lighter runs should be expected for a few weeks. Cattle—Cattle arrivals are around a thousand head. Choice steers are at a premium, very few being shown. Receipts are running largely to fair to medium and common steers. Cow stuff is also of the common ordinary variety. In the face of the ordinary quality of receipts the market is strong and snappy. Cows are selling about 25 cents higher. The best part of the steers sold as high as \$13.75. In general the cattle market is a strong 25 cents higher than it was at the close of last week. Hogs—Hog receipts were only 1700 head, of fair to good quality. Buyers were slow starting, but gradually advanced to top of \$16.85, bulk hogs going at \$10.65.
