Any citizen of Salem who wants to avoid membership in the Commercial club this week had better run to cover, for the committee in charge of the campaign for new members are putting out a corps of canvassers who will look a man straight in the eye and compel him to show cause why he should side-step what may be termed a civic duty. It is to be admitted that the men of Salem are subjected to many calls upon their time and pocketbooks, but the committee holds that this is something that has to do with the future industrial status of Salem.

Mrs. Margaret L. Mann, matron of the girls industrial school, acknowledges the receipt of a box of fine oranges, recently donated to the girls by Representative Ben Sheldon and wife—a gift that was very much appreciated and gratefully received.

The death of Joe Haines, a clothier well known in Salem, was reported in Portland Saturday, following an operation at the hospital. The funeral services are held at the Holman parlors in Portland today and the burial will be in Beth Israel cemetery. He is survived by one sister and his parents, Mr and Mrs. L. M. Haines, of this city.

The boys who were in the late war will receive a bronze medal, if the house of representatives has its way about it. A bill has been passed by the house appropriating \$10,000 for medals "of bronze and of a design to express the state's appreciation." The bill provides that the governor, secretary of state, treasurer, state librarian and adjutant general are to compose a committee to decide as to a suitable design, but that all shall be distributed by the adjutant general. The committee is also to decide who is entitled to the medals. The Oregon Spanish war veterans were given a bronze medal when they returned from the Philippine about 20 years ago. But they received no other special recognition.

Manager Miller of the Marion hotel had more business than he could handle for this evening. Two or three weeks ago it was thought that the legislature would adjourn Friday of last week and that the way would be cleared for the Christmas banquet tonight. But the legislators did not complete their work on schedule time and it was found necessary to postpone the big banquet until Friday evening of this week.
