PUBLISH REVIEW OF COUNCIL CONVENTION

Strike Vote To Be Taken By Metal Workers Effective April 1.

Portland, Or., Feb. 26.—The executive board made public today an official review of the proceedings of the Pacific Coast Metal Trades council which closed its annual convention Monday.

The "strike of the Metal Trades of the northwest" was endorsed, declares the official statement, which asserts a resolution was passed "that a strike vote be taken by the affiliated membership of the Pacific coast effective April 1."

"Any conference that may be arranged," continues the resolution, "shall not interfere with the strike vote, so that in case a satisfactory agreement is not reached by these conferences, the strike may be called upon the date set."

Another resolution states that the shipbuilders of the northwest "condemn as un-American and false the statement made February 7, 1919, in the house of congress by Representative Johnson of Washington state, wherein he stated that riots had occurred as a result of the strike and that the American shipbuilders were led by foreigners, and accept statement as a direct insult to the intelligence of American workmen, and as having been made with the direct purpose of prejudicing the just cause of the shipbuilders of the northwest, in the mind of the nation."

Score Burleson
 The government is charged with broken faith and Postmaster General Burleson is scored in the following resolution which the Metal Trades convention adopted:

"Whereas, the postmaster general has seen fit to repudiate the agreement between the president's mediation committee, the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company and the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, and

"Whereas, the government has shown that it will not keep agreements when not to its pleasure,

"Therefore be it resolved, that we advise against any labor organization entering into a compulsory arbitration or any other arbitration agreement until the administration recognizes the agreement which was made and carried out in good faith by the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, and be it further resolved that copies of this resolution be sent to the press, the postmaster general and secretary of labor."

Prepare to Cast Ballots

Seattle, Wash., Feb. 26.—Striking shipyard workers of Seattle, Tacoma, Aberdeen and Anacortes are preparing today to cast their ballots on the ending of the shipyard strike following an eight hour meeting of the Seattle Metal Trades council which ended at 3:30 o'clock this morning.

Polling of a return to work vote was made contingent on the holding of a conference between yard owners and government officials together with the workers on the Pacific coast. This conference is planned to take place at a meeting already arranged for Washington, D. C., on the suggestion of Charles Piez, director general of the Emergency Fleet Corporation.

Tacoma strike leaders in addition to representatives of the Aberdeen and Anacortes workers, took part in the Metal Trades council debate.

All state yards will be bound by the decision reached to take a referendum on returning to work.
