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### Oleomargarine Bill Finally Passes House

The famous oleomargarine bill, or as it was called the "most infamous piece of legislation ever appearing before the House" was backed to pieces by the interest from Portland, and supported by men from the extreme eastern part of the state.

What was originally proposed as a measure to protect the dairy and farming interests of the state against substitutes for butter was finally passed by the House yesterday after an all-day fight with nothing left excepting a tax on the manufacturer and wholesaler and at the other end of the line the hotel and restaurant.

As the measure first appeared in the Senate, it was proposed to tax butter substitutes 10 cents a pound. By the time the "interests" got through with the bill in the Senate, the provision was that the manufacturer should pay an annual license of \$1,000, the whole-

saler \$500, retailer \$100 and hotel \$25 a year.

The House chopped these figures down by its first amendment and when the bill came up for final passage late yesterday afternoon, it was provided that the manufacturer should pay annually \$500, the wholesaler \$250, the retailer nothing and the hotels and restaurants \$5. Also that those using oleomargarine in hotels and restaurants should specify by proper notice.

Estimating the cost of the extra sessions at \$1,000 a day, it cost the state of Oregon about \$750 to give the ornamental element in the House a final chance to orate, not to the speaker of the House or members, but to the visitors and lobby in the rear.
