YANK MOVING PICTURE MAN HALTS BATTLES

Machine Gun Operators Thought He Was Using New Kind Of Gun.

Berlin, Feb. 3. (By Mail.)—Battles between Spartacus rioters and government troops in the principal streets of Berlin had to stop several times to enable an American movie man to set up his camera.

The movie man was a chap in uniform who had been taking pictures of the battle front in northern France. He followed the Yankees into Coblenz, and then set out for Berlin to complete his series of pictures there. He arrived just in time for the January fighting. Eyewitnesses tell with amazement how this movie man took his reels of revolutionizing in Berlin. Perhaps his most daring feat was to get the details of the machine gun engagement in Wilhelmstrasse from both angles.

The movie man started out cranking it off from the Brandenburg Gate side of the street, near Unter den Linden. It was a pitched battle and machine gun bullets were raining horizontally both ways. From his position on the second story of a hotel the Yankee got the movement end of the action extremely well.

Then he decided to take the other side. Shouldering his camera he walked across the street. He had got behind it the shooting began again.

Another time he was cranking his camera from a second story window overlooking a lively engagement, when the Spartacans noticed him. They thought he was operating a machine gun, and a rain of bullets whizzed around him. He finished his picture and moved the camera out.

The Yankee movie man has a charmed life, according to the people who saw him.

State House Notes

Superintendents J. C. Conley of Walla Walla, C. E. Mulkey of Coos, W. W. Austin of Grant, and S. S. Dunsen of Yamhill will spend several days in the city this week, grading examination papers for their respective counties.

Wilford Allen, of the Industrial Accident commission, is absent from his office this week, having been laid aside by an attack of illness.

State Engineer Cupper and Superintendent Bennett of the banking department leave tomorrow for Hood River to take up the matter of an issue of \$150,000 in irrigation bonds with which to finance an irrigation district which was formed last year. Mr. Cupper will go on from there to visit the Ochoeco and Tumalo irrigation projects.

Secretary A. H. Lea, of the state fair board, is in Portland today on business in connection with the state fair.

Commissioners Buchtel Williams and Corey have gone to Portland in company with Attorney General Brown to confer with the state commissioners and attorneys of Washington and Idaho with regard to the increased railway tariffs. They will also take up the matter of federal control of the wires.

In the closing rounds of business of the legislative session Secretary of State Otlett was the subject of a resolution commending him for the courteous and very efficient service rendered by him and his assistants during the assembly. Geo. H. Dunsford, superintendent of the capitol building, also came in for "honorable mention" by the ways and means committee for the excellent condition in which the building had been maintained.

AGED MEN COMING WEST

Portland, Or., Mar. 3.—Colonel John L. May, commander of the 162d infantry, passed through Montana yesterday with 273 men of the regiment bound for Camp Lewis without passing through Portland, according to telegrams received here yesterday by Mrs. May and by William Heidt from the colonel. The men will be discharged soon after arrival at Camp Lewis and will be sent to their homes together through Portland on a special train, according to advice received by the general reception committee.

Another unit of the 162d infantry, comprising 173 Oregon men, is due to leave Camp Dix, N. J., today and to arrive in Portland about Saturday.

War time administration of the Panama canal zone was ended Tuesday, when an order was promulgated turning the government back to the civil authorities.
