PREDICT FUTURE FOR WILLAMETTE VALLEY

Wm. S. Walton, cashier of the Ladd & Bush bank, and Robert C. Paulus, manager of the Salem Fruit Union and president of the Salem Commercial club, lined up as most enthusiastic boosters for Salem and this part of the Willamette valley at the meeting held last evening at the Marion hotel to hear one of the big men of the Saturday Evening Post and other publications of the Curtis Publishing Co. of Philadelphia.

Sixty Oregon Men On Way To Portland This Afternoon

Aboard Special Train, Some where in Oregon, March 7.—Two hundred twelve Oregon and Washington soldiers are speeding toward Portland this afternoon, being scheduled to arrive there at 7 o'clock (P. M.) evening.

The sixty Oregonians aboard the special train are members of Companies M of Salem and L of Dallas, in charge of Lieut. L. H. Compton, of Salem. They belong to the 163rd infantry, the Third Oregon regiment.

There are 152 men on the train who are under the command of Lieut. J. V. Schur of Portland. Most of these are from the old Second Washington regiment, now the 161st. The other men are from North Dakota and Montana whence they were sent to Camp Lewis to fill in the regiment.
