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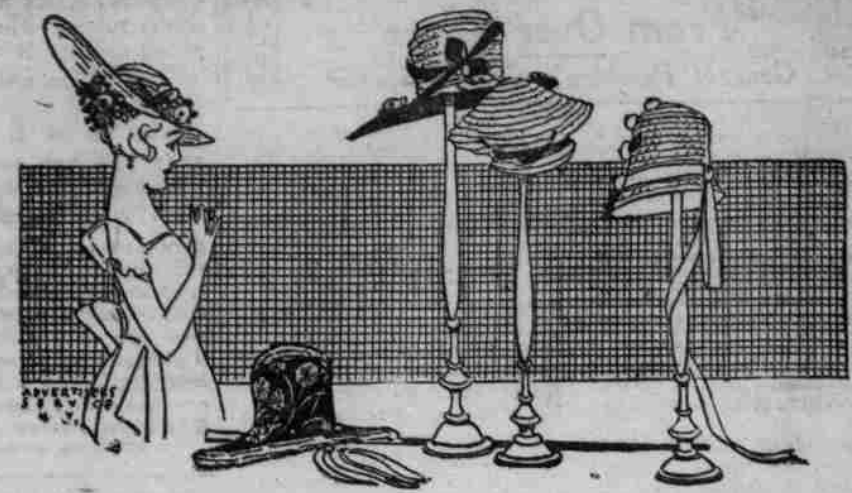

This will be the annual homecoming event which was not held in 1918 on account of war conditions. The preliminary plans are in the hands of a committee consisting of George E. Halvorsen, chairman; E. Cooke Patton, Mr. Craig, Ray Gilbert and Frank Bligh. At the homecoming two years ago there was an attendance of about 500 at the armory and an effort will be made at the coming event to bring together a much larger number. An elaborate program will be presented.

Saturday, March 15, a teachers' institute will be held in the auditorium of the Salem high school, to be attended by teachers from all parts of the county. The morning session will be devoted to round table talks in discussions of school subjects and methods of teaching. In the afternoon several lectures will be delivered. These will

include a talk by Dr. Carl Gregg Dohey, G. E. Halvorsen on his experience while on the firing line in Germany, Superintendent S. S. Dunean of McMinnville and Prof. E. D. Ressler, professor of education of the O. A. C. Prof. Ressler will talk to the principals of schools and bring up for discussion the question as to whether the principals association of the county shall conduct a field meet.

People are expected to go right on saving by the purchase of war savings stamps and for the purpose of stimulating thrift and incidentally helping the government, the executive committee for this county has been organized through the appointments of W. M. Smith, county superintendent of schools. On this committee are E. T. Barnes, A. A. Lee, Hal D. Patton, August Huck, Ben F. West and W. M. Smith. It is announced that no drive will be made but the committee will work to have war savings societies formed in every school district in the county. The slogan is to be "Save 25 cents a week." Letters will be sent to employers of labor asking their cooperation in putting before workers the proposition of saving 25 cents a week and investing in war savings stamps. Last year Marion county purchased \$972,000 worth of savings stamps, this figure being 92 per cent of its quota. As a whole the state of Oregon went over the top on war savings stamps.
