Business in issuing marriage licenses has been good at the office of county clerk U. G. Boyer. The records show that for the first dozen days of this month, 10 licenses were issued. Taxes are coming into the tax paying department of the sheriff's office at the rate of from \$12,000 to \$15,000 a day. After April 5 there will be a penalty attached on delinquents equal to one per cent a month. Then if not paid in full by Nov. 5, the penalty will go up to 5 per cent, in addition to the regular one per cent a month. Then if not paid by April 5 of next year, the property may be sold for taxes.

Day old chicks are available. That is, if any one wants to ship them at that age and if the little ones are properly boxed, the parcel post is one means of transportation. It isn't necessary to put any rations in the box as it is figured out that a day old chick thrives better when it doesn't have any refreshments for 36 hours or more.
