Do Not Favor Increases in Modern Woodmen Premiums

Washington, March 26.—A committee on foreign trade composed of members of practically all government departments and boards has been formed to stimulate and co-ordinate American trade abroad, it was officially disclosed today.
The foreign trade committee has been organized under an authorization signed by President Wilson. All government officers dealing in any way with foreign trade matters are reported. Among the urgent questions to be treated immediately are tonnage allocation, marine freights, cable and radio facilities, reconstruction loans, Latin-American loans, labor and immigration, key industries such as eye banking, strategic raw materials and a unified organization for buying goods in Europe.
It is understood that the persons actually sitting in conference will vary from time to time, but the departments represented include State, Commerce, Treasury, Agriculture, Labor, War, Navy and Shipping Board, War Trade Board, Federal Trade Commission, tariff commission, railroad administration, interstate commerce commission and postoffice department.
Chicago, March 27.—Hisses, cat calls and a riot followed introduction of proposals for 50 per cent increase in premiums of members of Modern Woodmen of America, in national convention here. An insurgent group opposing increased rates met in another hotel.
The sprang began during a speech by Charles Lyons, Des Moines, Iowa, attorney. He proposed adoption of a scale by which premiums of new members would be increased 50 per cent. Lyons was interrupted several times.
Judge E. A. Smith of Springfield, Ill., offered a resolution assuring each member to, make up the organization's deficit. Judge Smith asserted that before the war there was \$10,000,000 in the treasury, but that today there is only \$640,000. He said there were 1,067,000 members.
Officials regard it as unlikely there would be a vote on the new rates today.

Butte, Mont., March 27.—The official check of the poll books which was made by the city council last night showed that Captain William Cutts defeated W. F. Dunn, associate editor of the Butte Bulletin, for the democratic nomination for mayor at the primary election Monday.

DEATHS IN ARMY AND A. E. F.

Washington, March 27.—Deaths in the A. E. F. during the week ending March 6 numbered 453, the lowest since August, 1918, the war department has reported. Seventy-three were from injuries and 297 from pneumonia.
Army deaths in the United States for the week ending March 14 numbered 88, the war department also announced.

News Developments Served To Improve Market Today

New York, Mar. 27.—The New York Evening Sun financial review today says:
"Virtually everything in the way of news developments served to improve the tone of today's stock market, although trading was in relative small volume."
Prices advanced from the opening in the industrial list while the rails dragged. The oil and leather groups were particularly aggressive throughout. The tobacco groups made a good showing also, as did steel and equipment stocks which were aided by Mr. Hines' disclaimer of any intention on the part of the railroad administration to hold back equipment purchases, betterments etc. The coppers were not adversely affected by the passing of the Magna dividend nor the cut in inspiration. Instead inspiration stock turned strong after the announcement.
