**Adviser Helps Injured
Soldiers Get Training**

The government really intends to assist soldiers who have been wounded or injured in any way during their services in the late war and to look into such matters and to confer with men who might be given some assistance. Edward G. Cox has been in the city the past week. Mr. Cox is head of the national board for vocational education, department of rehabilitation and he came to Salem on this trip as vocational adviser.

The work of the vocational adviser is to confer with men who have been injured or wounded and to talk over with them as to what the vocational board can do and what course of study or education can be undertaken to best prepare men for their future work.

With some of the men who wished to follow special lines of farming such as poultry, the government will make arrangements for their attending the Oregon Agricultural college. Others who have mechanical ability will be assisted in securing the training that will make them expert workmen.

**Farm Loan Associations
Will Meet In Eugene**

The meeting of the different national farm loan association of the state, which is to be held at Eugene April third and fourth, promises to be one of great importance to the agricultural interests of the state. A. C. Bohmstedt, secretary-treasurer of the two local national farm loan associations, and who has had the work of arranging for the Eugene meeting, reports that representatives from all over the state will be present, and a good attendance is assured. Congressman W. C. Hawley will be present and enter into the deliberations of the meetings on the afternoon and evening of the third. Mr. Hawley is a member of the congressional committee which initiated the federal farm loan act, and which now has in charge several important amendments which have been proposed, and it is in the interests of these matters that Mr. Hawley desires to meet the men who are actually in touch with the workings of the present law. D. G. O'Shea, president of the federal land bank of Spokane, will also be present during the session. Oregon will be the first to "go over the top" with a state organization of the national farm loan associations of the United States and the development of the state organization will be watched with interest especially by the farmers and those interested in agriculture. Salem Chamber of Commerce will be represented on Thursday evening by its president, Robert C. Paulus, who will address the meeting on "Conditions at Salem and have tended to the stabilizing of marketing conditions and land values at Salem and in the Willamette valley."
