JUDGEMENT IN CASE OF MATLOCK STANDS

Supreme Court Sustains Decision Of Judge Bingham In Damage Case.

Among the decisions handed down this morning from the supreme court was that of C. N. Matlock, as administrator of the estate of Corn B. Matlock, deceased, vs. Julius Alm, et al, appealed from Marion county, decree by Judge Bingham. This was a suit in equity in which plaintiff charges the fraudulent conveyances of property on the part of defendant, and demands title to the property under the judgment of the lower court.

Other decisions were as follows: Thus, M. Askey, respondent, vs. Patrick B. Maloney, Thos. Swennes, and S. W. Surety Insurance Co., appellants; appealed from Multnomah, Geo. H. Bingham, Judge. This is a case in which plaintiff sought to recover damages from the above bonding company, as security for the defendant officers, for the accidental killing of plaintiff's decedent, plaintiff alleging that the killing was due to negligence or recklessness on the part of defendant detectives, who were shooting on the streets of Portland at an escaping prisoner.

Allen Rogers et al appellants vs. Charles E. Wills, et al; appealed from Multnomah; appeal from order of court setting aside verdict and ordering new trial of suit instituted for alleged breach of contract relative to conveyance of lots in Clackamas county; opinion by Chief Justice McBride; Circuit Judge Gatons affirmed.

Sanborn-Cutting company vs. Bay City Storage and Fisheries company, appellant; appealed from Tillamook; petition for rehearing denied; opinion by Justice Harris.

DANZIG QUESTION ONE GREATEST PROBLEM TO BE SETTLED BY RUNS

Officials Fear Routing Of Polish Troops Through City At Present.

By Frank J. Taylor. (United Press Staff Correspondent.) Berlin, March 30.—The Danzig question has become the most important issue in Germany. The government has taken the position that serious trouble may result unless the allies send General Haler's Polish troops to Warsaw by some other route than Danzig. Anti-Polish demonstrations have occurred in Berlin, Weimar, Breslau and Danzig. The old threat of bolshevism is reiterated, many conservative leaders declaring that if the government gives in to the allies a new radical uprising may be precipitated.

More California Troops Reach States This Morning

New York, April 1.—The transport Kentuckian, with 1904 officers and men from St. Nazaire, nearly 1500 of whom are from San Francisco or adjacent points, arrived here this afternoon. The organizations aboard the Kentuckian are the headquarters 162d infantry brigade, Camp Kearny, three officers and twenty men, in command of Brigadier General Vernon A. Caldwell; 383d infantry, regimental and first battalion headquarters, headquarters company, machine gun company, medical detachment and companies A to D, inclusive, 18 officers and 1462 men.

TROUT SEASON OPENS—MANY SALEMITS OUT

All-Fools Day Bids Ill For Poor Fish And For Poor Fishermen.

"All Fools Day" is going to be celebrated in proper style by a lot of Salem citizens—out on the trout streams. And it's dollars to doughnuts that there will be more citizens among the fooled than there are trout. For the month past there has been a circus-ticket business in fishing licenses. For a month the Waltonians of every age and degree have been looking forward to the opening of the trout season as the angelic boy looks to the 25th of December. Hence today, with ideal weather on the calendar, there is a grand rush to the riffles.

The fish have been well protected during the past year, some of the streams have been well stocked, and there is promise of rare sport to those who know the game. It goes without saying that Salem is the central point in one of the greatest fishing regions in the northwest. If Lewis and Clark and the fathers at Champeau had done nothing more for the American race, they would be deserving of immortality for securing title

to this piscatorial paradise. (By the way, some cheerful pro-creator vouchers for the statement that on the first day of every April, at 3 o'clock in the morning, the shade of old father Walton can be seen hovering about a cascade in the upper Santiam—with a broad grin on his face.)

One thing is dead sure—if the really managed to get back to the Santiam he would have the grin all right. A glance at the map of Willamette valley will show that a score or so of easy reach of Salem. All that is required is a Ford and an early start and you can have a trout breakfast in a setting of primeval grandeur. It doesn't matter what road you take out of Salem, it leads to a fishing ground. There are the upper reaches of Mill creek, Thomas creek, the forks of the Santiam, Silver creek, Kikkreall creek, the upper Luckiamute, Butte creek, Rock creek and various others that might be mentioned. These are accessible even at this season by automobile or motorcycle.

Some of the best grounds are within settled regions so that the enthusiast who wants to spend several days on the hike will find himself in reach of supplies. Later in the season, as the roads dry up, one can penetrate the fastnesses of the Cascade or the Coast Range, where fabulous catches of 15-inch monsters are recorded.

Naturally the mountain trout is the most common catch—they are indigenous; but fine catches are made from the planted varieties—Rainbow, Out-throat and Wolly Varden, and occasionally an unclassified brand of huge size and peculiar marking. As to equipment, the majority of sports prefer about a 7-ounce rod, and the most alluring bait at this season is either salmon eggs or some type of spinner.

Reed College Training Employment Managers

Portland, Or., April 1.—Four new courses for the training of employment managers opened at Reed college today, under the auspices of the federal board of vocational education. Reed is one of several colleges in the country which were chosen by the government to conduct the training. Among the instructors are Hudson B. Hastings, professor of applied economics in Reed college; Professor Ira B. Cross, University of California; Professor S. I. Miller Jr., University of Washington; Professor S. C. Kohn, Reed college; Wilfred S. Smith, federal director of the United States employment service in Oregon, and James H. Cary, president of the Employment Managers' association of the Pacific northwest.

CREDIT FOR RUMANIA

London, March 31.—The British government has authorized credits for Rumania sufficient to equip an army of 151,000 men, it was announced today. The Rumanians are at present fighting the bolsheviks in the Ukraine and are reported to be marching into Hungary and Bessarabia where soviet governments have been established.

Tonight there will be the grandest assortment of fish tales and fish tails ever seen here in many a month. And as usual, the biggest trout ever hooked will be the one that got away. The new law provides that the angler may take all trout of six inches or more, and he is at liberty to pull out a maximum of 50 before sundown, or an aggregate of 40 pounds in weight. The trout season is extended by one month, now running from April 1 to December 1.

Rescue Of Victims Of Dock Collapse Proceeds Slowly

Bristol, Pa., April 1.—Seven bodies have been recovered from the waters of the Delaware and many searching parties are dragging for others buried into the river late yesterday when a platform on which they were viewing the launching of the cargo carrier Waukan collapsed. The number of missing is variously estimated at from 12 to 18. Police are experiencing difficulty in checking up the list of missing, as some of those on the platform were spectators and others workmen of the merchant ship building yards when the accident occurred.

The structure, known as the patrol bridge, gave way under the weight of more than two score men. Twenty eight living persons were taken from the river soon after. The Waukan bid the patrol bridge from view of many spectators gathered to witness the launching, and minutes elapsed before they learned of the disaster. Meanwhile the vessel was launched on time. Police believe the suction of the 8800 ton ship as it struck the water may have drawn some of the bodies far into the channel. Police launches are dragging the river between Philadelphia and Trenton.

MANY HURT IN WRECK

Port Huron, Mich., April 1.—Twenty eight persons were injured, none fatally, late last night when an interurban car ran off the tracks in making a curve near here. Most of the injured were residents of Port Huron and vicinity. The car was jammed and among the injured were several women and children. The Bond Commercial club has gone on record as favoring a 50 per cent rise in property valuations.

Spruce Division Shows Net Loss Of \$12,000,000 Report

Portland, Or., April 1.—A dead loss of \$12,000,000 was experienced by the spruce production division in the Pacific northwest, according to a report which was made public today by Brigadier General Disque, who was in charge of the work during the war. This loss was due to the depreciation in value of assets. It will be appropriated among the allies as follows: United States, 34 per cent; Great Britain, 31 per cent; France, 24 per cent; Italy, 11 per cent. The entire expenditures of the spruce division approximate \$45,000,000.
