Now in order that a magazine may be sent to the soldiers, it is only necessary to attach a one cent stamp, but it is necessary to note whether there is printed on the upper right hand corner a notice to readers. If the magazine has this notice, the one cent will carry it. If not, there is no stamp to be attached. The notice one should look for is as follows: "Notice to readers: When you finish reading a magazine bearing this notice, place a one cent stamp on this notice, mail the magazine, and it will be placed in the hands of our soldiers, sailors or marines. No wrapping, no address."
