Court Overrules Demurrer Of Plaintiff In Bond Case

Judge Percy Kelly has overruled the demurrer of the plaintiff in the case of the Capital National Bank, Mattie F. Beatty and J. G. Moore against the city of Salem in their suits for the payment of bonds issued on the South 12th street paving. The plaintiffs are given until April 12 for further pleading.

The bonds for the South Twelfth street paving were issued about six years ago and it is contended by the plaintiffs that suits were brought merely to avoid the statutes of limitation.

The city in its answer through City Attorney Macy, contended that the contractors the Clark-Henry company agreed to wait for its money until funds had accumulated in the South Twelfth street fund and not to claim money from the general fund. Also that no statutes of limitation would apply to any special street paving fund when there is a probability that no money will be in that fund for several years.

Just at present there is \$500 in the South Twelfth street fund. The claims held by the plaintiffs in the three cases are next in number to be paid. The Capital National bank holds \$3,000, Mattie F. Beatty \$1000 and J. G. Moore \$1000.

CITY NEWS

Military men in the city announce that orders have been issued from headquarters of the Oregon national guard at Portland in which Colonel W. C. North has been recalled from the retired list and assigned to the command of the first regiment infantry.

Baumgartner took out his building permit yesterday for the large warehouse to be erected on Front street on the present site of the Brown planing mill. It is estimated to cost between \$8000 and \$10,000.
