RULES TO PREVENT FOREST FIRES GIVEN

Federal And State Governments Acting To Put End To Great Menace.

The forest fire menace is being fought by education. Federal and state governments are endeavoring to gain the cooperation of the public in reducing the enormous losses caused annually by these fires, most of which are avoidable.

The Pennsylvania department of forestry has issued a set of rules to encourage preventive measures, which are predicated upon statistics gathered over a long period of years and covering the most common causes of these conflagrations.

Unthinking shooters and campers are old offenders in this regard, an unusually large proportion of fires being traceable to their carelessness. The rules given below cover the more important measures to be followed in preventing fires and include the various classes of persons by occupation who are in a position to reduce the forest fire losses by increasing vigilance.

Rules
If you own timber land:
Impress all employees with necessity of being careful with fire in woods and of dropping everything else to extinguish a fire on or approaching your land. Keep existing roads and trails passable and free from inflammable material.

Open new ones if necessary to divide your forest into smaller stands.
Remove dead branches and debris from along borders of traveled highways, and especially from along railways.

Plow or burn safety strips along railways.
Clear up debris from border of your holdings.
Remove debris from against valuable trees.

Form or join an association for forest protection.
If you own a railroad engine, donkey, tractor or sawmill:
Have engine screened both as to smoke stack and ashpan.
Insist that engine be used carefully in or near woodlands.

When everything is dry and windy, shut down engine operation if necessary to prevent fires.
Burn debris along right of way, and around sawmill site.
Help to eliminate fire hazard wherever possible.

If you are a camper, fisherman, hunter or traveler:
Never build a camp fire without clearing ground 5 or 10 feet on all sides of where fire is to be built.
Always extinguish your fire. Make no mistake. Take no chances. Learn to be careful of your smoking material and see that it holds no fire when dropped to ground.

If you are a good citizen:
You will be careful and tell everyone else to be careful.
Start no fires on dry, windy days, nor near dry woodlands anytime.

Help educate your neighbors. Help secure good laws and stand by those who insist on having them enforced.
Notify nearest fire warden in case of fire and do your best to help extinguish any fires you see or of which you know.

NRS. WALDO RESIGNS FROM O.A.C. REGENTS

Portland Editor Appointed To Succeed Woman Who Served 13 Years.

After serving on the board of regents of the Oregon Agricultural college for 13 years, Mrs. Clara H. Waldo of Portland, has resigned, and Governor Oleott today announced the appointment of B. F. Irvine, associate editor of the Journal, to fill the vacancy.

This position will not be new to Mr. Irvine, who formerly served as a member of the board for 17 years during the period when the college made its greatest growth. Mr. Irvine's home was formerly in Corvallis and he is closely familiar with its problems. His prior term as a member of the board of regents ended in 1915. The board consists of the state board of education and nine members appointed by the governor.

Mrs. Waldo, the retiring member, has been one of the most active and loyal members of the board. In recognition of her donation of funds, Waldo Hall, one of the principal buildings on the campus, was named for her. She is the widow of the late John B. Waldo, a former member of the Oregon supreme court and whose father crossed the plains in coming to Oregon in 1843 and settled in the hills east of Salem which are known as the Waldo hills. The old Waldo farm is still in the hands of the family, now being operated by a daughter of Mrs. Clara Waldo.

"I regret very much to lose Mrs. Waldo from the board of regents," said Governor Oleott today, "as she has been broadminded, fair and able in the consideration she has given to the affairs of the college. She has always shown that she has the best welfare of the school at heart, and has contributed not only her time but liberally of her finances to the institution she loves."

"In filling the vacancy, I am more than pleased to be able to appoint Dr. Irvine, another staunch friend of the college who has given good service to the institution in the past. Because of his breadth of vision and his close
