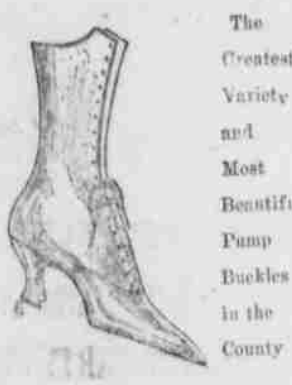

Income Tax Dodgers To Be Sought By Revenue Men Washington, April 7.—The internal revenue bureau has begun to comb the country for income tax dodgers. Commissioner Roper late today sent instructions to all collectors urging them to gather from all employers of labor the names and addresses of persons paid more than \$1,000 last year. This information must be in the hands of collectors by May 31.

Court House Elsie M. Tabler has sued for a divorce from Owen C. Tabler. She alleges they were married January 4, 1915, and that they have one boy three years old. Telegraph Rates Should Be Lowered, Says Postal Head New York, April 7.—Commenting on the recent raise of telegraph rates by Postmaster General Burleson, William J. Deagan, secretary of the Postal Telegraph company, declared today that Burleson should have reduced rates more than one-half. "Burleson says we are entitled to only \$1,680,000 a year for the use of our lines," Deagan said, "although we did earn \$4,260,000. Now, assume that is true, Burleson should have reduced rates over one-half and should collect only from the public what we are entitled to earn and what he proposes to pay us, namely \$1,680,900."
