The U. S. Government Recognizes Only Boiling Points As Gasoline Test

As the Standard Oil company points out in an announcement elsewhere in this issue the government has adopted boiling points as a standard test of gasoline value. The gravity test was discarded because it told nothing of the real quality of gasoline.

It was the needs of the war which caused the government to seek a standard test for aviation and general motor gasoline as part of its fuel conservation program. The demand for gasoline and other petroleum products had become so great that some action was necessary. Consequently, last summer President Wilson appointed a committee under the direction of the fuel administration to adopt standard specifications for gasoline.

This committee stated in its report that there would be no gravity limita-

tions in the specifications for either aviation or motor gasoline because it had been found that gravity was of little or no value in determining the quality of gasoline. The standards adopted were based on boiling points.

Gasoline is known to the refinery as one member of the petroleum family. He distinguishes each member of the family, not by gravity, but by boiling points. Gravity is a fleeting standard of test, but boiling points are unchanging in their value and always determine the quality of the product. Knowing them the refinery can keep his product uniform and reliable.

A boiling point is the temperature at which a liquid will begin to boil or vaporize. In distilling a given quantity of gasoline the refinery ascertains at what point each 10 per cent will boil, until the entire quantity is evaporated or distilled. In this way he determines what is known as the initial boiling point, as well as all intervening boiling points in the chain, up to the maximum, high boiling point.

The ideal gasoline has a continuous and uniform chain of boiling points, and should have enough low points to vaporize and to give easy starting. There should also be the right proportion of medium and high boiling points for quick acceleration, full power and long mileage.

As combustion starts with lowest boiling points and flashes off through the gas, the continuous, uniform chain is necessary for instantaneous full-power combustion. Only straight-distilled, all-refinery gasoline can have this full and unbroken chain.

The United States government's standard specifications, based on boiling points, are generally considered in the light of conditions today as the most practical standard for gasoline. They insure an efficient and satisfactory fuel, produced with due regard for conservation, and sold at a reasonable price.

New Garage Will Have Floor Space Exceeded By Few Shops

The Marion garage, with C. A. Campbell, proprietor, will open for business with the largest floor space in the city and with one of the largest floor spaces in the state, being exceeded by only two in Portland.

The garage is located in what is known as the Ryan building opposite the Marion hotel. It will occupy the entire two floors and these include a floor space of 34,000 square feet.

An electric elevator 9 by 20 feet has been installed which will be used in carrying cars to the second floor for repairs and other work. It is on this second floor that all repair work will be done. The first floor is to be used for storage. On this first floor is the wash rack.

The Marion garage will run night and day. Mr. Campbell has made arrangements by which its doors will not be closed at any time. He will give his entire time to the handling of cars and has engaged first class workmen to care for the repair department.

Mr. Campbell announces that his garage will be ready for business next Monday. The entire lower floor has been filled in about three feet and over all a fine cement floor laid. Having had an extended experience in this work Mr. Campbell feels satisfied the customers of the Marion garage will receive the best of attention.

ing officer takes no chances. If fraction leaders have not agreed he postpones the vote a day.

Between the parties there are fundamental differences which are supposed to be smoothed over, but which crop up. Generally the center is around the proposition of socializing industries and to what extent it should be done. It may be safely said that the Catholics and democrats are not for municipal control of industries, but have given in on this principle to meet the popular demands of the time from the working class, and because socialization seems the only way of getting wealth enough into government hands to re-establish Germany's credit.

The socialists on the other hand would socialize rather widely, though not to the extent that socialists in other countries favor. Sooner or later this difference between the parties will cause a split, it is believed by students of the situation. Neither the Catholics nor the democrats dare to join forces with the conservatives, after the declarations of Count Potoski before the re-igniting, in outlining the demands of the conservatives. Time and revolution have not changed the junkers. Potoski revealed to a somewhat amazed audience who that the spirit of the old regime was dead. The old, whiskered count recited the praise of the past government, declared monarchy the best form of government, and held that Germany under the Hohenzollerns had been the most advanced and civilized state ever known. The old system was best, he

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said, and the conservatives wanted it back. His repeated words that the junkers had always been opposed to war brought him only ridicule, and a few days later Marie Juchacz, the first woman to mount the speaker's platform in the reichstag, nailed the conservatives to the wall with, "Your old junker party is going to be entirely out of it in this new Germany."

While the conservatives have more votes and are almost equally as noisy, they have nowhere near the influence of the radicals. On the floor the radicals are voted down, but in committee meetings they are feared and their demands are considered. The radical strength comes from the nature of their following, almost four million down and out working people, who are ready to use force to get what they need, bread and butter, because they are hungry.

The "citizen parties" realize this, and though there is general resentment of the not too gentle radical tactics in the house, the government steers a course between, granting just as much as it can of the radical demands (not so much for the party leaders, but rather the people themselves, and on the other hand keeping its position solvent, if that is clear. The government cannot sow, and probably never have, grant what the radicals would have, but it must make concessions to keep peace.

This is the lineup of the parties, and

their platforms are the problems Germany faces. To the credit of the "citizen coalition," it must be said, there is a constructive, and the only constructive platform proposed. The others are impossible theories.

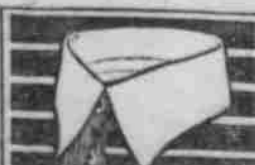
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
