In a report of the condition of Salem Lodge No. 334, B. P. O. E. for the six months ending April 1, 1930, the trustees present a statement showing that the assets of the lodge in money and real estate and lodge equipment amount to \$57,091.61 with not a dollar of indebtedness. One year ago the membership of the lodge was 777. On April 1 of this year this had grown to 894. During the past year 103 members had been taken into the lodge by initiation, five by affiliation by permit and nine re-established. Eight members of the lodge died during this past year. The membership of the lodge now is more than 900.

At a recent meeting of the public library board reports were presented showing that during the month of March 159 books were added to the library and 119 new names were added to the list of borrowers, bringing the total number of patrons up to 8219. There was a total of 5395 books loaned during the month. The total number of books in the library March 31st was 14,542. Of the total number of books loaned, possibly one third are in the juvenile class. It is noted that there is a large increase in the demand for histories, and also of books dealing with useful arts, science and languages. During the month four lectures were given, all well attended and appreciated. Three of these dealt with phases of French life and history, and one on the league of nations.

United States Flying Circus Starts On Victory Loan Tour

San Diego, Cal., April 10.—Its personnel including six famous American pursuit pilots, the United States Flying circus left here today for its trip for the victory loan. It will travel as far north as Seattle, as far east as Denver and as far south as El Paso.

Spectacular air exhibits will be staged by Lieutenant Colonel Thaw, commander of the famous Lafayette squadron; Major Kenneth Marr, one of the organizers of the Lafayette squadron; Major Carl Spatz, who while attached to the 13th pursuit squadron, won the distinguished service cross for his aerial achievements; Captain John A. Hambleton, commander of the 21st squadron, officially credited with crashing six Hun machines; Captain W. H. Hoover, 27th aero squadron, six planes; Lieutenant H. W. Pullmer, 9th aero squadron, three planes; Lieutenant George W. Puryear, two planes and many others.

Lieutenant Puryear was the first American aviator to escape from a German prison camp.
