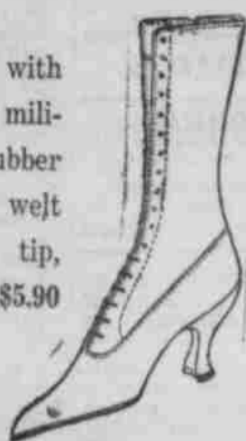

County Physician Cahatt, in company with a representative of the pure food office in Portland, recently made a trip of inspection to the local cheese factory which was brought into unsavory notoriety some time ago as being the source of a cheese containing poisonous in sufficient quantity to cause serious illness to a large number of people in this community. The two found the plant in good condition and the most rigid inspection failed to reveal any evidence of unsanitary maintenance. Some minor alterations in the operating rooms were suggested with a view to perfect cleanliness. It was noted that a new cheesemaker had been employed since the poisoning case, and there is no question but that the management will make every effort to prevent a recurrence of such a slight negligence on the part of an employee. A closer watch will be kept upon all such plants by the inspectors in future, Dr. Cahatt says; and at the same time he intimates that there are plants right here in the city that will bear investigation.

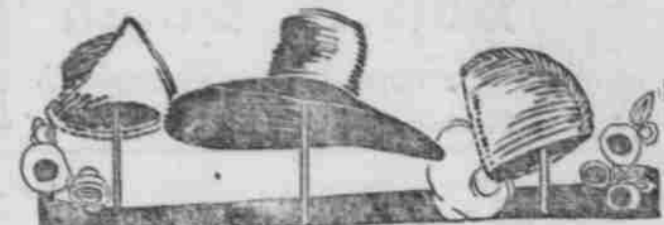
