WELL KNOWN IN SALEM.

The Rev. Basil Schriber, O. S. B., pastor of Sacred Heart church, Tillamook, who died on April 5th, was well known in Salem, and a large number of his friends went to St. Benedict's Abbey, Mount Angel, on Wednesday morning to attend the funeral.

Death was caused by double pneumonia following an attack of influenza, which was contracted ten days before.

Father Schriber was born in Conception, Mo., July 20, 1886, receiving his early education at that place. On completing his classes he came to Oregon and took up philosophy, later finishing his theological course at Mount Angel College and entering the novitiate of the Benedictine Fathers at the Abbey.

In a class of five, among whom was the Rev. Father Burk, of St. Joseph's church, Salem, he was raised to the priesthood by the Most Rev. Archbishop Christie, D. D., on June 5th, 1910.

During Rev. Father Basil's presidency of Mt. Angel College, a position which he filled most capably and well for four years, the college maintained its merited position among the higher educational institutions in the state, and won for its worthy president unstinted praise and deserved credit for the excellent results of his office.

Failing health obliged Father Basil to resign and after a year in the south he returned and took up the pastorate of Tillamook parish.

Solemn requiem high mass was sung at the Abbey chapel on Wednesday morning by Very Rev. Prior Maurus O. S. B. assisted by two of Father Basil's

classmates, Rev. Fathers Powers of Medford and Book of Salem. The body rests in the Abbey cemetery.

Father Basil is survived by his parents, a brother in the priesthood, Rev. P. Odilo, O. S. B., of Cottonwood, Idaho, three sisters and three brothers.

The kindly, noble influence of this priest will be felt for years to come, not only in the immediate vicinity of his labors, but in the entire state.
