PEACE BAROMETER AT HIGHEST TODAY

Paris Political Prophets Declare Competed Pact Nearly Ready.

Paris, April 14.—The peace barometer was high today. The treaty will be signed by May 1, according to French circles. This has been said before, but this time, the political prophets declare they will be able to make good. Premier Clemenceau said a delegation of deputies headed by Rene Renaud: "I am happy to tell you the question of reparations has been settled to our satisfaction; also the Saar valley." This was pointed to, as one sign of the approaching event. Another is the fact that Premier Lloyd-George left for England today after having publicly announced he would not leave Paris until an agreement was reached on all the main issues. A third sign is that the George Washington is due in Brest shortly for the purpose of carrying carrying President Wilson home. The French insist this is an indication that he considers his work nearly completed. A fourth is the general understanding throughout Paris that the "big four" will summon the Germans to Versailles not late, than the end of next week. The latest version of the same settlement is that France will be given a mandate under the league of nations over the whole territory which will be administered by a council of five delegates, of which will be a resident of the region. The French will police the coal basin, the mines of which, according to this version will belong to France in perpetuity. In the matter of reparations, according to this same source or information, France has been allotted fifty-five per cent of a total provisional sum of \$25,000,000,000 which Germany will be required to pay in gold, materials and negotiable paper. It is pointed out, however, that it is now impossible even to calculate the exact amount of reparations, owing to fluctuations in the prices of materials and values of securities. In general, the tone of the French has been better than in some weeks only the extreme right and left continuing to growl. The Echo De Paris accused Wilson of trying to please Germany. The Populaire, which is extremely radical, charges the peace conference with the execution of Wilson, in trying to turn the league of nations into a war machine. Governor Elliott has recently received a letter from a farmer in Wallawa, who raises objection to the law with regard to the poisoning of squirrels on the ground that not only other animals but song birds may be poisoned with the same "dope." He says: "I have noticed where the farmers have been poisoning there are lots of dead birds. I bought my boys some traps this spring and they have got the squirrels almost caught off my place. I think if the farmers would take their poison money and pay the boys a small bounty they would exterminate them lots quicker and save poisoning so many song birds and dogs and cats. I will wait for a reply before I buy poison. Answer immediately. Yours very truly, John N. Riggie, Wallawa, Oregon."

The past week has been a very slow one in the corporation department, there being nearly as many dissolutions of companies as there were new filings. Those filing articles were Fulton Elevator company, Fulton, capital stock \$25,000; The Island Lumber company, St. Helens, capital \$50,000; Oregon State Hotel Association, Portland, R. W. Price, president; Lohman Caning company, increased capital to \$50,000; Yamhill Development & Improvement company, McMinnville, capital \$100,000; Hawak & Smith Plumbing & Heating Company, Portland, \$2500; Lone Carpet Cleaners, Portland, \$4500; West Logging Company, Portland, dissolved; Stokes Company, Astoria, dissolved.
Engineer Copper returned Saturday from a trip to Sutherland where he went to look after the matter of a proposed irrigation district. The farmers and fruit men in that valley have just closed negotiations whereby they took over the holdings and water rights of the big orchard company that has been operating there, and have voted to form an irrigation district consisting about 4000 acres nearly all of which is set out to young orchard. This section gives promise of being one of the richest spots in western Oregon.
