MAN WHO LOSES LIFE ATTACKING ANOTHER NOT INSURANCE LOSS

Supreme Court Sustains Decision In Suit Appealed From Multnomah.

In the case of Ursula Meister vs General Accident, Fire & Assurance company, appealed from Multnomah county, Judge J. Benson of the supreme court, demonstrated by logic and precedent that a man who deliberately involves himself in a brawl or an assault upon another person, assumes all responsibility for death or injuries, and has no more claim upon an insurance company than a deliberate suicide.

In this case the appellant's decedent, Meister, at a certain time entered his rooms to find his wife engaged in a game of cards with one of his acquaintances—Stranger. A quarrel ensued, in the course of which Meister, who was armed with a pistol, assaulted Stranger, who, in self defense, drew a pistol and shot Meister to death.

The lower court Hon. W. G. Gates, judge, found for the defendant company, whereupon it was appealed to the supreme court, Judge Benson, in analyzing the case, cited numerous similar cases showing that such a claim could not stand, and in summing up held "that the very act of assaulting another with a gun is an invitation to that other to resist unto death, and if the aggressor is killed it is a natural and logical sequence of his own tortious act. The judgment of the lower court is affirmed."

Peace Not Possible Without League Of Nations—Taft Indianapolis, Iowa, April 15.—There can

be no peace treaty without the acceptance of the league of nations by the world, William Howard Taft told members of the Methodist church here last night. "The peace treaty means nothing if we cannot enforce it," said the former president. "Conditions in Europe are such that we must have a union of nations."

Taft said the covenant was not perfect and that perhaps it would not work as expected every time, but abolition of one-half of the wars is worth the effort and adoption of the league of nations. "Excessive armament of nations must be abolished if we are to have continued peace," Taft added. "The league of nations makes this its first step. Another great step toward peace in the covenant is the clause that makes secret diplomacy a thing of the past. Treaties must be made public."

Washington, April 14.—Withdrawal of the Japanese delegates from the peace conference is held entirely possible in diplomatic quarters here today. It is strongly hinted in Japanese diplomatic circles here that a league of nations pact, refusing to admit racial equality, will not be accepted by the Japanese people.

DESPONDENCY CAUSE OF CHESHIRE SUICIDE

Local Man Who Took Own Life By Shooting, In Poor Health For Months.

Thomas J. Cheshire of 1117 North Commercial streets committed suicide Monday afternoon about 4 o'clock by shooting himself in the head with an H. & B. double action 32-calibre revolver. He was often in the habit of going down to the banks of the river about 4 o'clock in the afternoon taking along some papers or books. Monday afternoon he took some papers and a blanket, saying nothing to the folks at home. A shot was heard by some of the employees of the Salem Kings Product company but no attention was paid to it as shots were often heard from the river bank.

About 6 o'clock Mrs. Cheshire became alarmed and went to the river to call him. She found her husband dead with a revolver shot through the right side of his head just back and above the right ear. Mr. Cheshire, who was 67 years of age, had been suffering from asthma and tuberculosis and left a note indicating that ill health was the cause of his taking his life. He formerly conducted a grocery on north Front street. Besides his wife he is survived by a son by a former marriage, Olive Cheshire, who is in the mercantile business in Milton, Oregon. Also a sister living at Eugene and a brother at Grants Pass.
