J. R. Wyatt has sued the Yaquina Electric company for \$20,000 which he alleges is due on a note. He also asks for \$1000 attorney's fees which he

considers a just amount in the suit.

In the suit of Mrs. L. Wilson against J. J. Stone to recover a team of horses, harness and wagon and some blankets, the defendant answers as follows: That he worked for Mrs. Wilson last December and that there is due him for wages \$154 of which only \$13.50 has been paid. A. Jessup Strang has filed his final report as administrator of the estate of A. E. Strang. The report was accepted and approved and the administrator relieved of further liability.

APPLE OUTLOOK SPLENDID

According to County Fruit Inspector Earl Penrey, Douglas county is to have a bumper crop of Spitzenberg apples this year, providing late frosts do not interfere. Weather statistics show that no late frosts have occurred in this section since 1913, and some are looked for this year. According to Portland papers an average of \$2.66 a box net was paid for a carload of Yellow New

town apples which were shipped from Oregon to Chicago some time ago. The car contained 630 boxes and the net price received was \$1680.59, which is said to be the highest price ever received in the upper Willamette valley for any kind of apples. The largest size brought \$2.85 per box.—Roseburg Review.
