## TRANSPORT ARRIVES WITH 2,892 YANKEES

### General Pershing's Band Included Among Troops On Von Steuben.

New York, April 19.—The transport Von Steuben arrived today with 2,892 troops aboard. She sailed from West on April 11.

Included in the troops on the Von Steuben were brigade headquarters of the Sixtieth field artillery nine officers and 66 men; the 10th engineers complete 46 officers and 1,611 men; the general headquarters A. E. F. band three officers and 101 men; twelve officers of the 128th field artillery; the 102nd aero squadron, three officers and 133 men; the 335th ambulance company, three officers and 133 men; Best contingent detachments number 160 to 170 inclusive, 699 men, and casual companies.

General Pershing's band returned on the Von Steuben. It was organized by Captain L. H. Fischer of Baltimore. The drum major was Sergeant Willis S. Ross of Kansas City Mo.

The band will tour the country for the Victory loan.

### Sailings Confirmed.

Washington, April 19.—War department confirmation of the sailing of the following organizations of the 77th and 42nd divisions was received late today: 77th division—headquarters and troops, 133rd infantry brigade headquarters, 206th infantry, complete, postal detachment and theatrical unit. 42nd division—47th field artillery brigade headquarters 151st field artillery 169th and 170th machine gun battalions, 117th sanitary train, ambulance companies number 165, 166 and 167; 117th engineers 117th engineer train and 117th supply train.

### BRITISH IN LIBAU

Paris, April 19.—(United Press)—British troops have landed at Libau (Rusina), where German troops have overthrown the Lithuanian government, according to the Deutsche Allgemeine Zeitung.
