At this meeting plans may be discussed regarding the proposed celebration of the 75th anniversary of the opening of Willamette university. Announcement has just been made that a final settlement has been made in the Upmeyer estate, in which there has been a friendly controversy for a long period, and which involves an endowment fund of \$30,000 for Willamette to spend Easter with his father, Mayor L.
