HEART OF HUMANITY PRESENTS STAR CAST

Austrian Lieutenant and Canadian Sergeant To Play Leads.

A group of distinguished visitors will be in Salem tomorrow evening in the interests of the greater film production. One of these is Lieut. Erik von Stroheim, formerly of the Archduke Karl's famous Uhlan regiment. Another is Sergeant Sidney R. Flower, who won military honors while serving with the Canadian forces in France. These two officers have contributed much to the building of the great Universal film drama—"The Heart of Humanity"—appearing for its initial run at the Oregon Theatre tomorrow evening. Lieut. Stroheim is notorious as the most consummate picture villain on the American film, having appeared in several of the greatest tragic pictures of the age. Salem will recognize him instantly as an artist in this role.

Over against him in the drama will appear one of the brightest stars known to the local public—Dorothy Phillips, who is the central figure in a group of artists, among whom is little Gloria Joy, William Stowell, Robert Anderson and Walt Whitman.

King's Death Signal For Korean Revolt

(By United Press.)
Tokyo, March 20.—(U. P. Mail.)—American witnesses of the Seoul demonstrations say that the crowds were not dangerous except when goaded to violence.

The Koreans say, according to reports, that the manifesto of March 1 will be followed by others. Thirty-three prominent men of Seoul signed the proclamation, including members of the Chun-do Kyu, Buddhists, Confucianists, Protestants and Roman Catholics. All of these who could be found were at once arrested along with other Korean leaders.

An American business man who has just returned to Tokyo from Seoul gave the following description of the imperial funeral:

"The funeral of the late grand prince was a memorable sight, but the most impressive thing about it was the great crowds of Koreans who thronged the city. We were told that there were at least 100,000 Korean farmers in the city for the day, all of whom had walked in from great distances.

"I went over the road between Seoul and Kimokuri, where the grand prince was buried, the day before the funeral passed over it, and I saw 50,000 Koreans all dressed in white, from children of 4 years to old men of 70, rebuilding the road along its entire length of 30 miles. All these worked as volunteers, to show their last respect for their former emperor. It was a great tribute to his memory."
