Now that the war is about over, the mail service is able to handle more parcel post packages. During the war the limit to Nicaragua was 15 pounds. Now one may send 25 pounds as the limit of weight at the rate of 12 cents a pound. Norway is also on the list again where parcel post packages may be sent. The limit of weight to that country is 15 pounds. Mail services is unannounced for Poland and parts of German Austria. However, to these two countries there is no parcel post mail as yet.

The city fathers broke the record for quick action last evening when within the space of seven minutes there was held both an adjourned and also a special called meeting of the city council. Both meetings were for the same purpose—that of considering an amendment to the city charter by which the city council should regulate the salaries of the city recorder and city marshal. All other city employees have their salaries paid according to what the city council considers right. As the city recorder and city marshal have their salaries fixed according to the charter amendment of 1903 when \$100 a month was considered high by law, it was thought by several of the councilmen that it would be better to place these two salaries in the hands of the council along with the others in order that they might be regulated from time to time. Hence at the adjourned and special meeting last evening, the considering of the ordinance were indefinitely postponed. As Mayor C. E. Albin was absent, on motion of Alderman Paul Johnson seconded by Alderman O. J. Wilson, Alderman W. A. Wiest was unanimously elected as mayor pro tem. Alderman Fred J. Smith made the motion to indefinitely postpone consideration of the ordinance for the adjourned session, and Alderman O. J. Wilson for the special called session.

At the meeting last evening of the executive committee of the boy scouts, it was decided that the boys should be given a camping out vacation this year. Waldo lake, southeast of Eugene, will probably be decided upon as the proper place for the camp. The scouts will take a train from Salem to Oak Ridge and hike over a trail to the lake. This trail is over an old right of way partly constructed by a railroad company that intended to build years ago. Three boy scout leaders will accompany the boys and all will be under the general care of scout executive Harold Cook. The only expense the boys will have will be the return fare from Salem to Oak Ridge, \$7.50. All other expenses of the three week's camp will be cared for by the executive committee. It is thought that from 50 to 75 boys will take advantage of this offer to camp out for three weeks this summer.

Russell M. Brooks, who is now in the intelligence service in France, writes friends here that he may take work with the U. S. consul in France. He expects to be demobilized soon. It is understood that the consular service is offering some special inducements to former men and it is probable that Mr. Brooks is considering a career in this line of service. Dr. Benjamin Sealey of Portland arrived in the city last night and this morning accompanied Rev. T. S. Anderson of the First Presbyterian church to Albany where they will attend a meeting of the Presbyterian committee.

C. P. Bishop left this morning for Albany on a business trip.

Cadet Cecil Nist, who went from this city to West Point last November, has recently returned to Salem to spend his holidays with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Chas. W. Nist. He is showing the training of the institution, and apparently he will be stationed with his surroundings. He states that there are now about 500 students at West Point.

One week from tomorrow the 76th anniversary of the meeting at Champeog will be observed. The event is officially known as Founders' day and as the 19th celebration. The date of the original meeting was May 2, 1843, but as no steamboat transportation could be had from Portland to Champeog on Friday May 2, it was decided to postpone it one day. There is now a suitable home as the original camp grounds for which \$5000 was voted by the 1917 legislature. The 1919 legislature voted another \$5000 but this money will not be used for additional building in gait late in the summer. For those going from Salem by the Oregon Electric, the train will leave at 9:45 a. m. and will be met at Wilsonville by a boat leaving for Champeog. The same boat will return passengers, leaving

Champeog at 4 o'clock, in time to catch the Oregon Electric, to arrive in Salem at 6:30 p. m.
