PRUNE MARKET OPENS IN ADVANCE OF 1918

(Continued from Page 1.)

the American prunes and especially those from Oregon. Last year the California crop was cut down half, not only in quality but in quantity by the unreasonable rains. At the same time the Oregon crop was larger than ever known and the quality of the prune was finer.

Hence many Americans as well as Europeans for the first time tasted the Oregon prune which happened last year to have an extra fine flavor. Since war conditions have devastated Serbia and parts of Turkey, these countries have not been even supplying their home demand. These countries also formerly shipped to this country before the Oregon and Washington prunes forced them off the market.

While it is rather early to estimate the crop in the Willamette valley, the general reports indicate favorable conditions. This is especially true of the crops in southern Oregon where it is practically out of danger.

The same cannot be said of the crop in the Willamette valley. In the low lands the crop is mostly set, while the trees are still blooming in the high lands. There is yet a danger from frost in the Willamette valley, according to the opinion of several old time prune growers.

The crop raised last year in the northwest, which includes Oregon and Clarke county, Washington, was the largest ever known in the history of prune raising. In 1916 this crop in the northwest was 42,000,000 pounds. In 1917 it was 23,000,000. But last year the record crop brought the production of prunes in this northwest territory up to between 55,000,000 and 60,000,000 pounds and at the same time it sold for the highest price ever known. Hence the prosperity of prune growers.

According to the present market, there is another year assured of prosperity to the prune growers, provided nothing happens at this critical time of year. By some, it is thought that the total crop will not run to the high figures of one year ago. Packers who are selling on the future market are taking some chances on a large crop.

There is a feeling among those in close touch with the prune situation that the present prices are most unusual and there is no assurance they will be maintained. But millions of people tasted for the first time the finest prunes ever grown. They came from Oregon and there is now an unusual demand for the Oregon prune.

New Cheese Factory In Jordan Valley

A trip up into the famous Jordan district Tuesday revealed the fact that there has been something going on in the beautiful valley this spring. One of the new enterprises is a new cheese factory, that has just opened. It is operated under the name of the Jordan Dairy association, and the place of operation is in the building that was used as a factory some time ago and which was closed on account of the scarcity of feed during the war.

The place is in charge of Peter McIntosh who comes from Coos Bay and Cogville where he had charge of both factories. He comes highly recommended as a cheese maker and will devote all his time to the factory.

The capacity of the plant will be 20,000 pounds a day. The farmers have contracted to sell their milk to this place and already they have more than enough contracted for, to assure a full season's run.

The farmers of the Jordan valley have commenced to see that good dairy stock is the right thing and a number of them are selling off their scrub cows and buying registered Holsteins. A number of the registered animals have been taken into the valley the past month.
