Prune growers in the Liberty district are not inclined to look seriously on the dangers from the thrip pest, S. H. Van Trump, county fruit inspector, said this morning. While a few growers had sprayed, Mr. Van Trump said none were spraying today. The Oregon Agricultural college authorities are inclined to look upon the thrip as a serious menace to the prune trees, but to all other crops elsewhere. A meeting of the state board of horticulture will be held next week to consider the situation and to learn the exact conditions. There has been a disposition to quarantine Marion county shipments of nursery stock on account of the thrips in the Liberty district and this side of the issue will be taken up at the board of horticulture meeting.
