San Salvador Quake Kills 40 And Injures Many More

Washington, April 29. — (United Press.)—Forty persons were killed, many injured and much property damage was caused by a severe earthquake in San Salvador yesterday, the state department was advised today. Slight shocks recurred at intervals during the day.

The American legation at San Salvador, though damaged, is still standing. No Americans so far are listed among the casualties. E. G. Oeder has been appointed guardian of Frank Oeder, who has been adjudged insane. The guardian is ordered to make an inventory of the estate, to manage same and to render account to the county court from time to time.

COURT HOUSE.

In the case of Benjamin Bowden versus Sarah E. Bowden, an order was issued that service should be by publication, as the defendant could not be found in Oregon.

A decree has been issued by the circuit court in the case of Alice E. Page versus Henry Fawk, wherein the plaintiff is given judgment for \$1112, with \$105 attorney's fees and \$34.50 costs. To satisfy this judgment, it is ordered that eight lots in Nob Hill subdivision in Salem and four lots in Walnut Grove addition in Salem be foreclosed.

In the case of John E. Farris versus J. M. Watson, a petition has been filed that the objections to the cost bill be placed on the docket for hearing next motion day.

B. B. Herrick, E. M. LaFore and J. N. Skaffe, referees appointed by the court to divide the land in dispute in the suit of E. C. Naffziger against M. L. Jones, have rendered their decision. It is that 10 acres of the land in dispute be awarded to the plaintiff and that the remaining 147.52 acres be awarded the defendant. The land is in T. 6 S. R. 2 W. It cost \$60.50 to have the three referees go over the land with a surveyor.

The estate of Carl M. Anundson, who died April 14, 1919, is valued at about \$6000 in real estate and \$600 in personal property. By a will, the widow, Carrie Anundson, was appointed as executrix to serve without giving bond. The court appointed as appraisers, Tollef Anundson, T. P. Ristengen and J. W. Ryett.

G. W. Humphrey, E. O. Beckley and Hugh Blyeu were appointed appraisers of the estate of Thomas S. May, who died April 9, 1919. Ida M. May, the widow was appointed administratrix.

In the matter of the estate of Archie Ray Gibbons, the administrator George W. Gibbons made his final report to the county court. The report was accepted and approved and the administrator relieved of further liability.

The final account of Ole A. Loe, administrator of the estate of Mathilda Quill, has been approved and accepted by the county court and the administrator relieved of liability.

STATE HOUSE.

Superintendent Churchill is today mailing out to the teachers of Oregon a copy of the Oregon Memorial Annual with a view to emphasizing the significance of Memorial day. It gives the rules of flag etiquette, quotations from Lincoln and from several famous American writers, and a number of poetic gems that have come up out of the world conflict, including the immortal verses of McGuffey—"In Flanders Fields," and that of Charles Buxton Going—"Red-Robed France." The little booklet will be found very helpful in making up the Memorial day program. In his note of introduction Superintendent Churchill says in part: "Sacred as the day has been in our national life, this year its meaning has been broadened and enriched by our participation in the world war. It is fitting then, that in our observance of the day this year we give thought to its widened scope, and that we render tribute to the memory of that vast multitude of men of all nations who in the recent war made the supreme sacrifice."

With this added weighty reason for the observance of Memorial day, no community should let the day pass without fitting recognition. And I can conceive of no recognition more fit than the formal observance of it in the school room.

Engineer Cupper left today for Central Oregon, where he will visit a number of big irrigation projects within a 75-mile radius of Bend. Among others will be the Squaw Creek basin where the farmers are organizing an irrigation district and have requested the certification of \$20,000 worth of bonds for a small irrigation project. He will also stop at the Ocochee project in the Prineville region.

The prominent legal firm of Wood, Montague & Mattheissen, of Portland, have today filed a brief in the case of Olcott vs. Hoff, in which there is unqualified endorsement of the excellent brief submitted recently by Judge Lovell, of Pendleton. The same main precedent is cited, and there is a comparison between the Oregon constitution and the United States constitution as to the matter of transfer of office by the death of the chief executive. The brief states that it would be remarkable if the Oregon constitution on this point could be construed exactly opposite to the intent of the United States constitution. It was the intent of the founders that Oregon should have a real governor, but a more ex-officio or acting functionary. If the constitution really provided that the secretary of state should be a mere *locum tenens*, upon whom the duties of the governor's office devolved, there might arise endless controversies not a his duties and privileges. It was the evident intent of the constitution that the secretary of state, on the removal of the governor, should become governor in every sense of the word.

Superintendent Bennett, of the state banking department, recently declined to approve the articles of incorporation for a third bank at St. Johns, on the ground that another bank at that point was not warranted by the conditions. The incorporators have appeared from the order of the board, and a hearing is held this afternoon before Governor Olcott.

Commissioner Wells, of the insurance department, has had his attention called to the fact that there is evidence of a combine of insurance companies in the state for the purpose of fixing of the rates on bonds issued by surety companies to public officials. The case of County Treasurer Lewis, of Multnomah, was cited, he having been compelled to pay 50 per cent more for his \$50,000 bond than he has paid in the past.

The hearing granted to U. A. Bass in the governor's office yesterday afternoon regarding the establishment of a third bank at St. Johns, was an exhaustive one, and resulted only in the banking board taking the matter under advisement. Mr. Bass was re-informed in presenting his case by Dr. Mulkey, of St. Johns, and Conrad P. Olson, who laid down plausible arguments in favor of the incorporation, while against it were representatives of the Peninsula Ship Building company, the Peninsula National bank, and the First Trust & Savings bank of St. Johns, all of whom supported Superintendent Bennett in his refusal to approve the articles of incorporation.

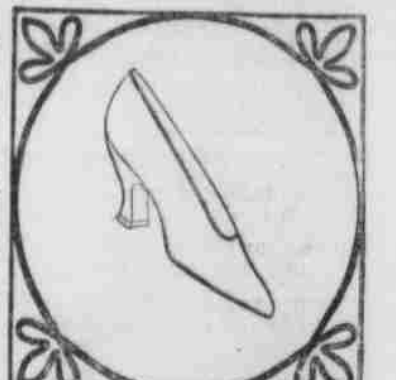
The second brief to be filed this week in the case of Olcott vs. Hoff is that of the legal firm of Carey & Kerr, of Portland, who base their argument upon

the principle laid down in the historic case of Marbury vs. Madison, with a decision by Chief Justice Marshall, in which the eminent jurist acted rather upon the urgent need and public import of the matter in hand rather than upon the subtle technicalities of the case and thereby established for all time a precedent and principle in interpretation—aiming at the just and unimpaired effect in public policy. This brief also follows the line of that of Judge Lovell in the contention that Mr. Olcott is governor of Oregon in fact and in person—not a mere functionary upon whom is temporarily placed the duties of the governor.
