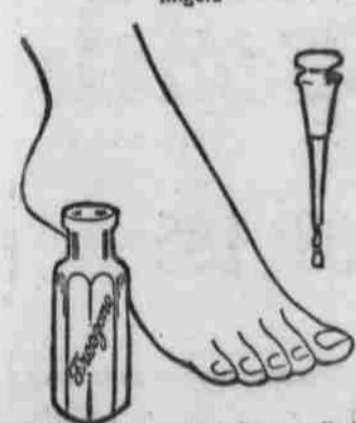

2000 MORE YANKEES ARRIVE IN NEW YORK

Further Transport Sailings From France Announced At Washington.

New York, May 2.—Two transport docked at Hoboken today with returning soldiers. They were the Nieuw Amsterdam and the Canonicus. Board the Nieuw Amsterdam were 2078 men, including the 302nd engineers; 302nd engineers train; 77th division headquarters detachment and 309th field artillery detachment.

Washington, May 2.—(United Press.)—Transport sailings were announced by the war department today as follows: Battleship Georgia, bound to Boston, due May 12 with 121st field artillery. Transport Pelee, St. Nazaire to New York, due May 15, with detachment company M, 119th infantry; 108th machine gun battalion; 108th field artillery, headquarters company, sanitary, ordnance and veterinary detachments and batteries A, B, C, E and F.

REDDING FEELS QUAKE

Redding, Cal., May 2.—(United Press)—A sharp earthquake shock was felt here at 1:20 this morning. Everybody awake at that time felt the shake, which is said to be the most distinct since 1906. Buildings rocked and doors banged, but there was no damage.

FIELD ARTILLERY AT O. A. C.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis May 1.—A definite agreement has been entered into between President W. J. Kerr and the war department for the establishment of a field artillery unit at the college next fall. Major Edward C. Hanford and Captain E. B. Wetting-ott have already been detailed to the college to have charge of the preparatory work, and other officers are either on the way or expect to be assigned soon.

Equipment valued at \$300,000 will be sent by the war department including between 90 and 100 horses and mules, up-to-date guns, trucks, wagons, and engineering materials. The latter will be available for instructional work at the college. The object of the unit is to train officers, although in peace times the men will not necessarily see active service. Only a few institutions in the country will have these units.
