FIRE AT DALLAS DOES DAMAGE TO GROCERY

Blaze Believed Started By Sparks From Bonfire Behind Store.

Dallas, Or., May 3.—A fire in the rear of the Messner grocery store on Court street Thursday night shortly after 6 o'clock damaged goods in the store room of the establishment to the amount of several hundred dollars. The fire is believed to have been started from a bonfire which had been burning a great part of the afternoon in the rear of the postoffice building adjoining the grocery store and it is thought that the high wind of the latter part of the afternoon fanned the flames until they set fire to the building. The room occupied by the Messner grocery is owned by R. E. Williams and is covered by insurance. Mr. Messner also had his good insured.
