department of public instruction, replying to a communication from Mayor Baker of Portland regarding the battleship Oregon, says:

"I wish to acknowledge the receipt of your letter under date of May 6, together with a copy of a letter from Mr. Monroe Goldstein to you. In reply I wish to say that I am most heartily in sympathy with the movement to meet the government's plan of giving the historic battleship Oregon to Oregon. Ways and means should be found whereby the maintenance expense of \$20,000 a year be raised by the people of the state.

"I was somewhat relieved on reading the third paragraph in your letter to learn that there are other ways of providing money for the ship, since all of the schools have had their work interrupted again and again during the past year through the epidemic of influenza and for a large part of the remaining time of study, for the purpose of assisting in promoting war activities through the school. I am sure that you are so familiar with all this that I need not go into detail as to the splendid assistance they asked to undertake to assist in promoting the war.

"For these reasons I feel that the schools should not be called upon to carry the burden of financing the movement to secure the battleship Oregon until the meeting of our next legislature. It is quite urgent that teachers and pupils give themselves over to their tasks during the remaining days of the school

REDMOND HIGH BOY WINS STATE MEET

Arthur Tuck Is Marvel Performer Of Oregon High School Athlete.

University of Oregon, Eugene May 12.—Arthur Tuck of Redmond, representing the Redmond high school won the state championship interscholastic track meet here Saturday afternoon single handed. He placed first in seven events, second in one, and smashed three state records, taking 38 points. Jefferson high school of Portland was second in the meet, with 34 points. Other schools scoring points were: Franklin, Portland, 21; Washington, Portland, 14; North Bend, 10; Hood River, 8; Lincoln, Portland 7; Medford 6; Lebanon, 5; James John, Portland, 3.

Tuck's work against a field of 120 entries is considered to be most exceptional. Tuck placed first in the 100-yard dash covering it in the record time of 10 seconds flat. He also took first in the sprint, with a heave of 45 feet 4 inches. In the high hurdle he again led the field, doing the distance in 16 3-5 seconds. In the high jump he defeated Gassaway of Hood River, who placed second, clearing the bar at 5 feet 8 inches.

Javelin Hurled Far Tuck established a new mark for the javelin, his best heave of the afternoon being 123 feet 10 inches. He also took first honors in the 220-yard dash, his time in this event being 25 2-5 seconds. His seventh first place was in the javelin, which he threw 174 feet 8 inches, beating the best previous record, held by "Duke" Mulkey of Mouth by 30 feet. This mark for the javelin is about 20 feet better than any made Saturday in the meet between the University of Oregon and Oregon Agricultural college. The eastern Oregon phenomenon was second in the broad jump with a mark of a little better than 18 feet made in the qualifying round.

One of the best races of the afternoon and the only one in which Tuck appeared to be pressed at all was the 100-yard dash in which Coulter of Jefferson high came in a close second. In the mile run the field was led by Wright of Jefferson, but he was disqualified for crowding Peake, who was closing in on him on the home stretch. Wright crowded over two lanes in violation of the rules and was disqualified. The Oregon track was in fine shape for the meet and "Bill" Hayward ran off the finals in just two hours. The awards for places, relay and individual high point winner were awarded at the junior prom by Governor Obott.

Jefferson high school had probably the best balanced team in the meet and they fought hard for the first place. James John did not show as well as was expected, although they were runners up in nearly every event. In the relay the Hill military academy of Portland, had a clever team entered and they crowded Jefferson for first place in this event.

During the meet, Ralph Spearow of Multnomah club, tried for the world's record in the pole vault. Spearow's record in this event still stands in the interscholastic circles and was not endangered Saturday. He also is holder of the coast record for the pole vault, established last Saturday in Portland in the meet between the University of Oregon and Multnomah club. The highest mark at which he was able to cross the bar Saturday was 12 feet 3 inches. He made several tries with the pole resting at 12 feet 3 inches, but was not able to clear the bar.

Matter Of Junior High Gymnasium Being Held Up

The matter of the proposed gymnasium buildings for the junior high schools of Salem seems to have remained in innocuous quietude during the past few weeks, the initial steps being hung up between the committee in charge, the school board and the interested citizens. There has been no disposition on the part of Chairman Clark to call a special meeting of the board, as it was certain that a full meeting could not be arranged. The chairman of the committee has not considered it good policy to make a definite move in the matter until through petitions, and the

circulating of petitions is a matter that they expected to be taken up by the interested citizens. It was the hope of these citizens when the matter was propounded in a public meeting that the board would arrange for a special election before the close of the schools. But as the earliest date upon which such an election could not be called would come within a few days of the general school election, it is felt that the extra expense is not warranted. Should the promoters of the idea get rapid action on petitions during the next three days, it may be possible to get enough signatures on petitions to be presented at the regular board meeting on Tuesday night so that the matter can be put on the ballot of the regular school election.

Both the school board and the committee are non-committal on the question of establishing the gymnasium buildings, recalling what has been the temper of the taxpayers in the past with regard to extensions of school facilities. There is no question as to the need of the equipment and the benefit to be derived, and they are very ready to push the project provided the mass of taxpayers are disposed to take hold of it cheerfully and unanimously.

James W. Seavey Champion Of State Shooters' Tourney

Portland, Or., May 12.—Averaging 97.23 per cent, James W. Seavey of Portland Gun club won the 1919 Oregon State Trapshooting championship from the largest field of shooters ever entered in a state tourney. This was the first tourney under the rules of the American Trapshooting association, which call for 300-target in the state championship event. Seavey's score on the 30 was 293, one bird better than the score registered

by W. K. France of Arlington, who was the "dark horse" of the shoot. France broke 147 out on the first day and was leading Seavey by two birds until the seventh and eighth events, when the strain proved too much and he dropped five out of 35 targets. He had gone straight up to that time. Seavey, in winning the championship accomplished what a great number of his fellow club members believed he would do, but the score he made was three birds higher than a majority of them figured would win the honors.

Ford's Libel Suit Opens Again In Mt. Clements

Mr. Clements, Mich., May 12.—Henry Ford's million dollar libel suit against the Chicago Tribune, which was first brought in 1916, opened in circuit court here today, Judge J. G. Tucker presiding.

The suit was entered when the Tribune, in an editorial, referred to Ford as an anarchist because of Ford's stand on military preparedness during the Mexican border trouble.

Action was first brought in federal court at Chicago, but later was deferred and brought into the Michigan court. Both sides have engaged high legal talent to represent them.

It was expected three weeks will be necessary for a final selection of the jury. The trial itself will extend over two months, it was believed.
