CONDEMNATION SUIT AGAINST HOLMAN HOME

Salem School District Wants Clear Title To Property Recently Purchased.

Salem school district No. 24 has brought suit in the circuit court against Caroline H. Meyers and husband, Mr. and Mrs. Mark S. Skiff, John Holman, the Capital National bank and the city of Salem.

The suit is to secure the condemnation of the property just south of that occupied by the Salem high school known as the Holman property.

The complaint sets forth that Jane Holman died June 21, 1908, and that she was the owner of the south half of lot 6 in block 3, city of Salem.

On July 20, 1916 the Capital National bank commenced suit against Carolyn H. Meyer and husband and secured judgment for \$1222.49 with interest and \$70 attorney's fee and this became a lien against the property.

For paying the alley north of the Holman property, there is still due \$47.99 and for the paving of High street in front of the property, there is due \$231.33 with interest since 1914.

On March 24, 1919, Carolyn H. Meyer and husband gave a trust deed to the property to Mark S. Skiff, which the plaintiff believes was given as security for indebtedness.

suit against Carolyn H. Meyer and husband for \$520 and caused a writ of attachment to be issued against the property.

It is claimed in the complaint that the total value of the property is \$3,250 and that the defendants have interests amounting to \$1958. It is asserted that the Salem school district has attempted to agree with the defendants as to the value of the premises and that the interests of all had been purchased excepting that of Carolyn H. Meyer and Mark S. Skiff.

It is also alleged that the school district has entered into possession of the property and is now using the same and has actually purchased the interest of Walter J. Holman and Victoria McCarrie, but is unable to agree as to a value with Mark S. Skiff.

It is alleged that the district is unable to acquire the full title to the land except by condemnation proceedings. The district asks that assessments be made of damages by reason of taking over the property and that upon the school district paying the amount assessed, it may be given clear title to the property.

The property involved in the suit is just south of the high school building and has been used by the school for teaching classes in domestic science.

Court House Notes

In the suit of the Oregon Holding Co. against W. S. Mott and others, the defendant Mr. Mott has filed an answer in which he prays that the relief asked for in the complaint be granted the plaintiff; that the mortgages in question be foreclosed but that the parcels of land be sold separately. He also asks that the proceeds from the sale of lot 7, block 28 be applied first to pay the claims of the plaintiff. This lot is on North Commercial street between Union and Division streets.

The county court has ordered that the sale of city property in the estate of Elizabeth Krueger be continued until June 2, 1919.

The estate of Iona Pearl Sheldon has been appraised at \$7945. The appraisers were Hall Sheldon, Paul Jerman and Henry Ritchey.

solves from him any communication, he may make, would be passed, and committees appointed formally to notify the president.

The reading of the president's message may follow immediately or it may be deferred until Tuesday.

Clerks to Read Message. The message will be delivered this time by readings clerks to each house, instead of before a joint session, as when the president reads it in person.

Republicans have already formulated their legislative program. Democrats are awaiting the president's message to determine upon theirs.

The president, it is believed, will recommend among other proposals, the following:

Return of the telephone and telegraph lines, with proper remuneration for the owners.

Return of the railroads under some new system of more unified administration.

Greater public interest and less wasteful competition.

Suffrage. Ratification of the Colombian treaty. Development of land and natural resources to take care of unskilled labor.

Maintenance of the United States employment service and war labor board. Speedy action on the appropriation bills.

A budget system of financing the government and other matters.

Merchant Marine Up. Disposition of the American merchant marine in such a manner as to assure private initiative and enterprise, but with the influence of the government at least temporarily maintained for guidance and aid.

His possible discussion of his peace work in Paris to date is awaited with greatest interest. His treaty message probably will be delivered by him in person when he returns to this country early next month. Maintain, however, his proposal for a league of nations is to be immediately subjected to widest discussion in the senate, republican leaders declared today.

Washington, May 19.—(United Press)—Bills were unloaded today in both house and senate as a congress prepared to get under way.

One of the first will be repeal of the luxury taxes. Representative Moore, Pennsylvania, prepared the measure in the house, and Senator Penrose in the senate. If passed, it will take off those

new taxes on clothes over a certain price, ice cream sodas and many every day luxuries.

Representative Moonerson, Minnesota, and Senator Kellogg have identical resolutions for immediate restoration of the telephone and telegraph properties to their owners and demanding an accounting from Postmaster General Burleson of the way the money appropriated for government operation was spent.

Many bills dealing with establishment of a budget system have been drawn. Senator McCormick, Illinois, formulated a series of them. Under their provisions the president would assume direct responsibility for all financial recommendations made by departments and congress would assume responsibility for appropriations and for auditing expenditures.

"Reds" Are Targets. In both houses numerous measures are aimed at curbing bolsheviki, anarchists and "red" propagandists.

Senator Overman, chairman of the committee that investigated bolshevik propaganda has a drastic bill covering many phases of the subject.

Senator King, Utah, has one making it an offense to belong to the I. W. W. or any other organization teaching sabotage or interference with the government in any other way. Another measure of King's provides the death penalty for sending a bomb through the mails.

Limitation of immigration, deportation of anarchists and bolsheviki and suppression of "red" publications is sought in other bills. The woman suffrage resolution is scheduled for early action in both houses. It must pass again as this is a new congress.

Senator Kenyon has formulated a measure for rigid government regulation of the packing industry.

Resolutions and bills for investigations of various phases of the cost of living also will be offered early.

Senator King has a bill directing the state department to negotiate a treaty with Mexico for appointment of a joint commission on claims of American citizens who suffered through bandit depredations.

McArthur Proposes Change. He also has a bill providing that all public lands shall be ceded by the federal government to the states within which the lands lie. Another measure King offers provides that the interior department and the Indian bureau shall be moved from Washington to various points in the west.

Representative McArthur, Oregon, has prepared a bill for three sessions of each congress instead of the two now provided for.

Senator Jones, Washington, has a bill for a temporary shipping policy.

Senator Kenyon sponsors a bill creating a federal industrial relations committee and another creating a housing commission, to report to congress on a way to make it easier for everybody to own a home.
