POPULAR OPINION OF ALASKA FAR FETCHED Salem Visitor Says North Country Temperatures Not Excessive. Dr. B. Vinton Ellis, who for the past six years has been engaged in practice and hospital management in the mining regions of Alaska, made a flying trip to Salem yesterday for a brief visit with his father, Dr. J. V. Ellis. He had been on a business trip to Tacoma and while that near to Salem ran down to say "hello." On account of the great rush into Alaskan territory at this time of year he had to leave again yesterday afternoon in order to catch a boat out of Seattle. He stated that the crush of immigrants and laborers is such that all passenger space on the boats filled up "three deep." For several years Dr. Ellis was retained by the great Trendwell Mining company as physician in charge of their hospital, but on the collapse of the working several years ago he took up similar work with the Chicago Mine company, located about 180 miles inland from Juneau, where he has charge of a hospital and in kept very busy. He has a broad smile for the people who express wonder at his taking up a location in a frozen, God-forsaken country of rough-neck, as depicted by Rex Beach and the movie films. He states that during the past winter the lowest thermometer record at the mines was 22 above zero and goes on to tell of modern facilities that equal anything on the northwest coast--of people that have more hustle and initiative in a day than they can show in a week in Oregon or Washington--of vegetation and flowers in the summer season that rival anything this side of the tropics. GOVERNO RAPPOINTS Governor Ocott announced today that he will appoint the following as members of the state board of architect examiners, created by the recent legislature: W. G. Chandler, Marshfield; to hold until May 30, 1920; M. H. Whitehouse, Portland; to hold until May 30, 1921; Lee Thomas, Bend; to hold until May 30, 1922; J. E. Wieck, Astoria; to hold until May 30, 1923; W. C. Knighton, Portland; to hold until May 30, 1924. The act becomes effective May 29. Under the law no one is eligible to serve as a member of the board unless he has resided and practiced the profession of architecture in the state for not less than five years previous to the passage of the act. The board may select a secretary outside of its own membership at a salary to be determined by the board. Such secretary need not be an architect. The Cathlamet Timber company, which has not been operating since last October, has resumed work with a full crew.
